

EXPLOITERS MUST RENOUNCE HOMES

CARRANZA DECREES THAT FOREIGNERS OBTAINING RIGHTS IN MEXICO MUST NOT DEMAND PROTECTION OR COMPLAIN

EL PASO, Tex., Aug. 19.—American Consul Garcia has received notice that Provisional President Carranza has issued a decree declaring that Americans and all others acquiring mineral, forest or other rights in Mexico must renounce their citizenship.

The decree says foreigners also must renounce their rights to complain against conditions in Mexico and their right to demand protection from any other country.

STANFORD WOMEN RANK ABOVE MEN

STATISTICS SHOW ALSO THAT NON-FRATERNITY MEN ARE BETTER IN SCHOLARSHIP THAN FRATERNITY MEN

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Calif., Aug. 21.—Women students are much better in scholarship than men, and non-fraternity men better than fraternity men, according to statistics recently announced by the registrar of Stanford.

Of the whole body of women students, only 2.5 per cent were given their first failure or dismissal during the last school year. Four per cent of the sorority girls and only 1 per cent of the non-sorority girls were given their first failure or dismissal.

Sixteen per cent of all the men students at the university were given their first failure or dismissal, while 21 per cent of fraternity men and only 15 per cent of non-fraternity men were in this class.

Scholarship among the men is getting poorer, too. Last year's percentage of failures or dismissals was higher than the previous year, when 16 per cent of the fraternity men and 13 per cent of non-fraternity men received their first failure or dismissal. Last year's figures are higher than any previous year at the university.

PERSHING TROOPS MAY BE MOVED

RUMORED THAT GENERAL FUNSTON HAS RECOMMENDED SUCH ACTION, BUT SECRETARY OF WAR BAKER IS RETICENT

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 21.—Secretary of War Baker today refused to discuss the report that General Frederick Funston, in charge of the troops on the border, had recommended withdrawal of General Pershing's expedition into Mexico.

Secretary Baker said: "It is the war department's policy not to discuss rumors and to discuss only its own actions." The report that Funston had recommended withdrawal of the punitive expedition comes on good authority, and is persistent.
