GOVERNOR WITHYCOMBE SAYS HIGHWAY COMMISSION WILL TRY TO MEET KLAMATH DELEGATION SEPTEMBER 1ST.

Indication that the state highway commission will be glad to see the Klamath delegation that is to appear before it in the interest of the proposed Florence-Eugene-Klamath Falls highway is contained in the following letter from Governor Withycombe by the Klamath Commercial Club:

"Your letter has been referred to Mr. John H. Lewis, state engineer, with the request that if possible arrangements be made with the other members of the commission to meet with your delegation at that time. "Doubtless you will be advised by Mr. Lewis of the time arranged for the meeting."
