STRAHORN GOES; KLAMATH'S MOVE

RAILROAD BUILDER LEAVES THIS MORNING FOR PORTLAND, AND WILL AWAIT ACTION OF THIS COMMUNITY

After holding a final meeting yesterday afternoon with the three committees appointed to secure rights of way and \$300,000 for the Central Oregon railroad, Robert E. Strahorn left this morning for Portland. He will return any time he is called by the committees.

Mr. Strahorn has shown the line the proposed road will follow, and has stated what he expects of Klamath Falls. There is nothing more for him to do until this community acts.

Mr. Strahorn stated yesterday afternoon that his chief engineer, H. N. Bogue, will remain here three or four more days to complete final surveys and prepare maps showing the line the road is to follow.

U. S. TO PAVE ITS PART 11th STREET

THE CITY MUST CONTRACT WITH THE GOVERNMENT AND THEN WITH GARRETT TO GET STREET PAVED

Paving of the north half of Eleventh street, between High and Washington, along the property of the United States, is to be begun soon. This was decided last evening by the city council, after it was learned that the paving could be done by the city entering into a contract with the government for the work.

When the work of grading and placing of rock on Eleventh street was being done, no work was done on that half of the street that lies adjacent to the government property. Not even was the curbing laid along this side of the street.

The council did not know what to do to get the street improved, because the government would not enter into a contract with J. H. Garrett, who has the contract for improving Eleventh street.

C. E. Widdoes appeared before the council last night at the solicitation of City Attorney Groesbeck, and explained that although the government could not enter into a contract for paving with an individual, it could contract with the city.

An emergency was declared by the council last night, and an ordinance authorizing Mayor Crisler to enter into a contract with the United States for the improvement was passed. The contract will be prepared this week, and work commenced as soon as the government approves the contract.

MAN MOURNED AS DEAD REAPPEARS

DROGGED SEAWARD BY UNDER-TOW WHILE BATHING, CLUNG TO LOG, AND LATER WAS PICKED UP BY STEAMER

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 22.—Clarence Peacock, washed seaward last week while bathing, and mourned as dead, reappeared this morning.

Peacock did not regain consciousness until several days after he had been on the steamer.

HUGHES SPEAKS IN MANY TOWNS

URGED MAINTENANCE AMERICAN WAGE SCALE AND PROTECTION TO AMERICAN INDUSTRIES AT VISALIA

VISALIA, Calif., Aug. 22.—"Before the war this country had armies of unemployed as a result of anti-tariff legislation," said Charles E. Hughes, republican candidate for president, during his speech before 2,000 people here today.

Mr. Hughes urged maintenance of the American wage scale and protection of American industries. He spoke from the platform of his private car in several towns between Sacramento and this place.

RUSSIA MAY GIVE JEW SAME RIGHTS

BILL WHICH INDICATES CHANGE IN MIND OF GOVERNING CLASS OF RUSSIA TO BE PLACED BEFORE DUMA

PETROGRAD, Aug. 22.—The United Press is reliably informed that a bill granting to Jews in Russia the same rights before the law enjoyed by other Russians will be introduced in the duma next November.

This bill marks a great step forward in democracy in Russia, for years the stronghold of monarchial absolutism. Probably in no country in the world has the Jew suffered greater persecution than in Russia.

Just what part the present war has played on the attitude of the public mind toward the Jew, or rather toward equality of rights, cannot be definitely stated. Yet it is felt certain that the great conflict has hastened this step toward democracy.
