EAGLE PASS, Aug. 22.—British Consul Marshall has wired to Ambassador Spring-Rice that Dr. Walter Staub, Swiss and Malcolm Muir, Englishmen, have been arrested at Piedras Negras as American spies.

The Englishmen are in jail now, and have been given only bread and water for the last forty-eight hours.

Ambassador Spring-Rice has wired to Provisional President Carranza demanding the release of the men. Both are geologists, and were in Mexico on a searching expedition for geological specimens.

Getting Serum for Infantile Paralysis



Scores of men, aroused by the call of the health authorities of New York city for a serum to fight infantile paralysis, which has taken off more than 1,000 children in two months, have offered themselves in New York hospitals. The surgeons draw blood from the arms of those who previously had the disease. From this they make the serum. While they do not assert

that this serum is a specific for the disease, there have been many cases of improvement after its use. This photograph shows the blood being drawn from the vein of a man who offered himself to save the babies. The surgeon, after placing a constricting band about the upper arm to hold the blood, inserted his needle and sucked up blood from a vein.

JOHNSON FIRST SHUNNED TENNIS

NATIONAL TENNIS CHAMPION
WOULD HAVE BEEN UNHEARD
OF BUT FOR PLEA TO SWITCH
FROM FOOTBALL

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 23.—If Bill Johnson, national tennis champion who will defend his title at Forest Hill one week from today, had had his way he would not be the peer of all American racquet welders. Probably he would have been mentioned in the sporting pages only as a former football player at the University of California.

It was Bill's mother who dissuaded him from following his football ideals and turned his attention to the tennis courts. The secret came out when Robert Johnson, the champion's father, discussed his son's career in an interview today.

"When Bill was about eleven years old," said the elder Johnson, "he was quarterback on the boys' football team that used to play on the vacant lots in the Haight street district. All of his thoughts were of gridiron glory. He was proud of the bluggy nose and crippled legs as a soldier of a wound received in battle.

"His mother was not very enthusiastic about football and it was through her efforts that Bill joined S. R. Marvin's boys' tennis club when he was fourteen.

"It was plain from the start that he had natural talent for the game. His long distance running as a little boy gave him speed on the courts. All the club tournaments ended with the finale between Bill and 'The Shrimp,' a lad now generally known as Johnny Strachan. Together in the doubles they were invincible. Playing against each other, sometimes one, sometimes the other, would win. I believe that team is still invincible in the doubles.

"Bill has won half a hundred cups and other trophies, but I believe the prize he appreciated most was a pair of flannel pants he won at Stockton when funds were low.

"Incidentally, Marvin's boys' club also produced Maurice McLoughlin, Peck Griffin and Dr. Melville Long, in addition to Strachan and Johnson."
