HUGHES RECORD AS GOVERNOR

W on the part of democratic news-HILE there is so much criticism papers of Governor Hughes for his frank discussion of the weakness of the policy, or lack of policy, of the democratic administration, it is interesting to review the record of Charles Evan Hughes while governor of New York. His record is so clear that any charge of his being a man without a policy falls flat. His policy for the future can be judged from his action of the past and shows that he is qualified to discuss national questions of the greatest magnitude.

A communication in the Oregonian of a recent date from Hon. Charles B. Moors gives some interesting accomplishments of Governor Hughes. He says in part:

"What is Mr. Hughes' record as governor and what do the progressives of the country really think of him? The record shows that as governor of New York he forced legislation for a compulsory 'workman's compensation act'; for a greatly improved system of factory inspection by adding more and more expert inspectors to the work; for definitely and wisely limiting the hours of labor of women and children, according to certain years and classes; for the extension of the 10-hour law for street railway employees in cities of 50,000 and upwards; for the transference of the enforcement of the regulations concerning the employment of women and children in mercantile establishments in first class cities from local boards of health to the department of labor; for a law urged by the railway brotherhoods, providing for payment of wages twice a month instead of once a month; for a law facilitating and specifying the means of the enforcement of sanitary provisions in factories; for designating the number of occupations in which children under 16 may not be employed; for an amendment of the eight-hour law, and the law concerning the employment of children in mercantile establishments, in order clearly to define their scope as originally intended; for reorganizing the department of labor; simplifying its administration; for providing for the establishment of industrial and trade schools in connection with the public schools and in connection with this, an important provision giving employers and employees a voice in the management of such schools. To the commission appointed to consider the subject of employers liability he also assigned the subject of unemployment. Among other measures looking toward the protection of immigrant workmen, he brought private banks under state supervision and compelled a stricter checking up of notaries public on the part of the governor. Space will not permit reference to all of the beneficial legislation he brought about. Take the record and compare it with the much-vaunted accomplishments of Woodrow Wilson.

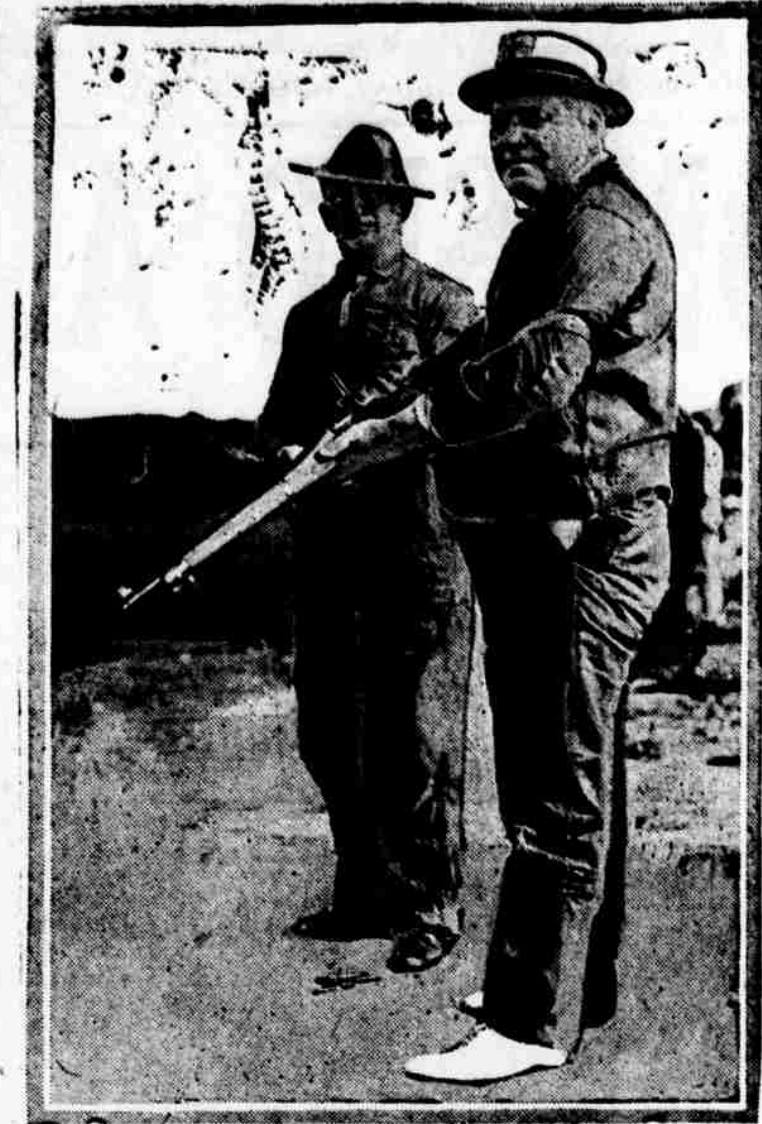
It is only necessary to quote the following from The Legislative Labor News, recognized organ of the New York State Federation of Labor, published by John O'Hanlon, at Troy, N.Y., in October, 1910. It says:

"Now that Governor Hughes has retired from politics and ascended to a place on the highest judicial tribunal in the world, the fact can be acknowledged without hurting anybody's political corns that he was the greatest friend of labor that ever occupied the governor's chair at Albany. During his two terms he has signed fifty-six labor laws, including among them the best labor laws ever enacted in this or any other state. . . . Only 162 labor laws have been enacted in this state since its inception in 1777—in 133 years. One-third of these, exceeding in quality all of the others, have been enacted and signed during Governor Hughes' term of three years and nine months."

The attitude of every progressive leader of real prominence is well expressed by Mr. Raymond Robins, chairman of the last progressive national convention. Mr. Robins, by the way, was formerly a democrat. In a recent address, after referring to the endorsement of Hughes by Roosevelt, Hiram Johnson, Governor Brumbaugh, Bob La Follette and others, he says:

"My home state of Illinois is an illuminating example of the general experience. A fatal incapacity for efficient administration, or fundamental
