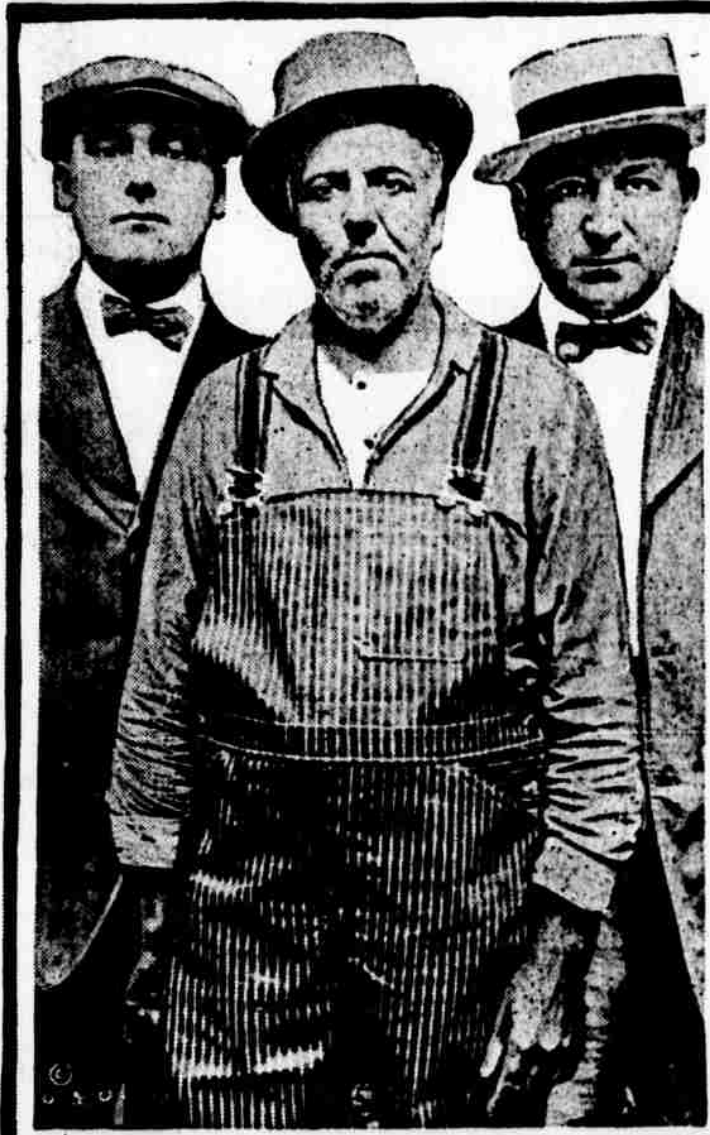
Milliner Arrives.
