This is the first photograph of Captain Charles A. Fryatt, British captain of the steamship Brussels, who was shot to death by the Germans at Bruges, to reach the United States. He tried to sink a German submarine and was captured. The British government has recommended the granting of an extra pension of \$500 annually to Captain Fryatt's widow, besides the sum which she is entitled under the government's compensation scheme. The Great Eastern railroad, of one of whose ships Captain Fryatt was the master, is also granting his widow a \$1,250 annuity.

and fight the case if it should get in court is evidenced in the fact that of all the railroad bond issues voted in Oregon in recent years, every one was thrown out by the supreme court except the Grants Pass issue for \$200,000," said Mr. Glenn. "Our attorneys drew all papers in that election, so we feel certain that we are competent to make your election valid and your bonds salable."

City Attorney Groesbeck explained that there is a state law prohibiting any municipality from holding part of the stock in any company or corporation. This is the stone wall before which Roseburg and several other Oregon towns have fallen. But this law can be got around, without being molested or its sanctity assaulted, by proper drawing of the ordinances and other papers in connection with the election, said Mr. Groesbeck. It was stated that the attorneys for Keeler Brothers know how to do this legally, as they did it at Grants Pass, and will make no charges if Keeler Brothers are successful bidders for the bonds. Mr. Glenn left this morning for Portland. He stated last evening that attorneys for his firm have been engaged to prepare the papers for the bond elections at Lakeview, Bend, Prineville, Burns, all of which are to vote bonds for the Straborn railroad.

## POOR RICH BOY SHIFTS GUARDIAN

**COURT DECIDES BOY WHO INHERITED \$2,000,000 ESTATE MUST GO BACK TO STEPFATHER'S MOTHER**

NYACK, N. Y., Aug. 25.—Willie Crossman Lee, "the poor little rich boy," who cried and said he was "tired of being dragged around the country by relatives interested in the \$2,000,000 estate he inherits from the late William Crossman, coffee king, will shift guardians again here today. Supreme Court Justice Tompkins decided that DeWitt H. Kenyon, Port Chester lawyer, must return the boy to Mrs. Emma Kenyon Lee, mother of Frederick T. Lee of White Plains, stepfather of the boy.

The battle for possession of the \$2,000,000-estate has waged hotly for more than a year in the New York courts between William Mills Jr. of California, father of the boy, and Lee, his stepfather. His father started seven separate actions to get the boy and the management of his estate, but lost every one.

The boy's mother, who divorced

Mills and married Lee, died in New York two years ago. Testimony at the hearing said that Mills had never taken any interest in his son until he inherited the estate of the coffee king. The boy testified that his mother had impressed on him the desirability of remaining with his stepfather.

The lawyer Kenyon was appointed guardian a few months ago, and the boy was taken away from Lee. Lee and his mother hid the boy, and were haled into court. It is expected they will now be permitted to keep him.
