INSANE ARTIST IS NOW RECOVERING

RALPH BLAKELOCK, FAMOUS ARTIST, COMMITTED TO AN ASYLUM BECAUSE POVERTY AFFECTED MIND, IS IMPROVING

MIDDLETOWN, N. Y., Aug. 25.—Ralph Albert Blakelock, the famous artist who has been confined in the state asylum here ever since he went insane over the poverty of his family

It was not until many years after he came to the asylum here that Blakelock was elected to membership in the National Academy. When he lost his mind he had been selling what he could of his now world-famous and extremely valuable moonlight scenes for scarce enough to buy food for a few days.

About a year ago Blakelock showed signs of returning sanity and unmistakable evidences of the return of his clouded genius. His fellow American artists started a fund to provide for him at a private sanitarium, with a cottage in which he will paint the picture marking his election to the academy. Blakelock's family will not be with him.
