WILSON REVERSES HIS FORMER STAND RUMANIA AND ITALY DECLARE WAR ON GERMANY

PRESIDENT OFFERS **ANOTHER PROPOSAL**


Questions Except Eight Hour, But Railroads May Refuse.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 28.-in hepes of averting a nation wide strike of railway employes, President Wilson this morning presented a new proposal to the railroads, suggesting a settle-PUBLIC SCHOOLS ment on the basis of an eight-hour ary, which is not to become effective uptil an impartial commission investigates and arranges details of the plan. President Wilson is willing to give the commission a year's time, if necessary. He deferred this morning's presidents so they would have time to consider his proposal.

He does not intend to hear their fual proposal, submitted Saturday, while there is a possibility of secur ing changes in the terms of his new proposal.

If present negotiations to avert a strike fail, President Wilson intends to recommend that congress pass a law similar to the Canadian disputes

Allies Say Rumania's Declaration Is Greatest Allied Achievement of War, and Predict Surrender of Central Powers Within Year Because Communications Are Cut Off With Bulgaria and Turkey.

ROME, Aug. 28 .-- Italy yesterday deciared war against Germany, alleging that Germany is using her military forces to aid Austria, an enemy of Italy.

The people of Rome and of many stcaller Italian towns wildly cheered the news when it was announced. -

The declaration of war was sent to Ferlin through Switzerland.

LONDON, Aug. 28 .- Following a meeting of the crown council, Rumania has declared war against the central powers. According to a dispatch from The Hague, Germany will hand passports to the Rumanian minister today.

This action has been daily expected because of Greece's entrance into the war against the Teutons.

Continued invasion of Greece by Bulgarians caused meeting Saturday and yesterday in Athens, where King Constantine was renounced for falling to aid the allies. He was urged to prepare for war at once.

The Rumanian third army has mobilized near the Hungarian border. and is expected to invade Transylvania within a week.
