

President of Balkan Fight Is Political, Says Mason

YORK, Aug. 28.—To create an effect in Rumania in the main of the present activity of the Balkans. There is a possibility that the allies will make a major offensive at this time. The Greek base unless they are that Rumania intends to enter with them.

If Rumania still hesitates, it is possible minor operations will be continued by the allies along the Greek border, in order to satisfy Rumanian public opinion still further; but if Bucharest positively declines to enter the struggle there is little possibility of an allied move into Serbia and into Sofia at this time.

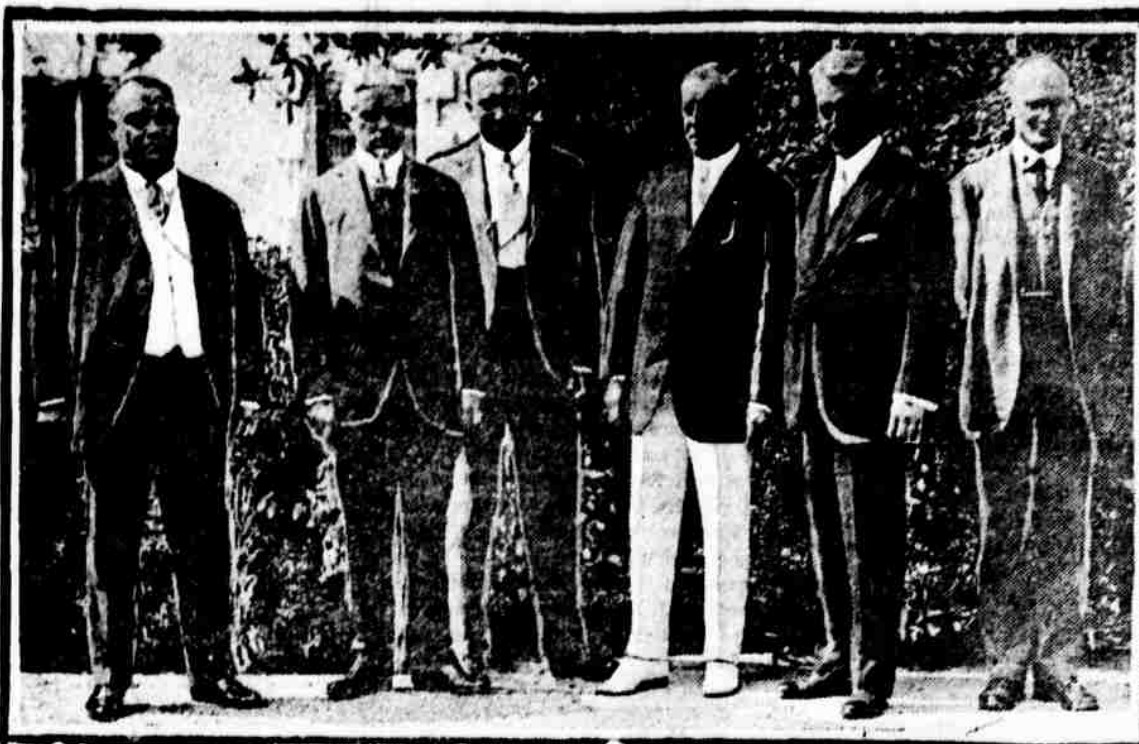

Houston Explains Plan for Spending Road Fund

PORTLAND, Aug. 28.—Secretary Houston has just announced the plan to be pursued in spending the \$10,000,000 appropriated by the federal aid road act for the construction and maintenance of roads and trails within or partly within national forests, and has tentatively allotted among the various national forest states the million dollars which is expendable this fiscal year.

The tentative allotments to the principal national forest states are as follows: Alaska, \$46,280; Arizona, \$59,795; Arkansas, \$11,294; California, \$140,763; Colorado, \$62,335; Idaho, \$108,010; Montana, \$9,901; Nevada, \$19,195; New Mexico, \$42,622; Oregon, \$127,794; South Dakota, \$8,115; Utah, \$40,982; Washington, \$91,739; Wyoming, \$40,566.

In addition a total of \$9,552 has been tentatively assigned to Florida, Michigan, Minnesota, Nebraska, North Dakota and Oklahoma, while the Eastern states, Maine, New Hampshire, Virginia, West Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee and Georgia, in which the government is purchasing lands for national forests, have been allotted \$21,057.

"In general," said Secretary Houston, "the states and counties will be required to furnish co-operation in an amount at least equal to 50 per cent of the estimated cost of the surveys and construction. However, upon a satisfactory showing by the applicant state or county that such proportion of co-operation is equitable, it may be altered, and the ratio of co-operation fixed upon a basis equitable to both the state or county and the United States."

The method followed in apportioning the money was explained by Secretary Houston as follows: Ten per cent of the amount available each year will be withheld as a contingent fund. One-half of the remainder will be allotted to the states in amounts which will be based on the area of national forest lands in each state. The other half will be apportioned on a basis of estimated value of timber and forage resources which the forests contain. Amounts apportioned but unexpended within three years, and any balance of the contingent fund which remains unapportioned at the end of each year, will be reapportioned on the same basis as the original allotments.

The two groups of states to which lump sums are allotted are, it was explained, to be considered as single units of apportionment. Apportionments now to be made, giving consideration to the number and character of applications made by the state and county officials for expenditures on specific projects. These applications must be filed with the district foresters in the seven national forest districts on or before January 1, 1919, for the fiscal year beginning the following July 1.

The determination of the projects upon which funds will be expended during the current fiscal year will be made on the basis of applications which must be filed with the district foresters on or before October 1, 1918. Each application must contain a statement of the public needs to be served

Deutschland Carried the American Flag on Mast

BERLIN, Aug. 28.—An American flag was flying at the Deutschland's mast when the first commerce submarine to cross the Atlantic returned to her home port.

"How are you?" I shouted in English, from the deck of the yacht Gazelle as we approached the Deutschland.

"Very well, indeed," replied Captain Koenig, with a broad smile. Then tipping his cap he led the crew in three cheers for the neutral, German, and even the allied newspapers.

Thousands of school children were crowded along the banks of the Weser, singing national songs, and yachts, tugs, sloops and other small craft sped hither and thither to catch a glimpse of Germany's sea marvel. We left Bremen aboard the Gazelle and journeyed toward Bremerhaven. In the distance the Deutschland appeared, swimming low like a duck, escorted by two tugs and followed by another ship carrying the guests of honor, including Count Zeppelin, Dr. Helfferich and other ministers. The ships whistled their salutes. Guns were fired. It was a most impressive sight to see the Germans obtaining their first view of the Deutschland. Tears filled the eyes of many, while the captain and crew lifted their hats to repeated greetings.

We rode alongside the Deutschland as she moved toward her dock. She bore no scratches. The only evidence of her long sea journey was the fact that she was blackened aft, from the smoky exhaust. She entered Bremen harbor under her own steam, while bands played "Deutschland Uber Alles," and anchored beside the special tug at 12:10 p. m., where she was officially welcomed. Public spirited and wealthy men contributed \$25,000 to a purse given to Captain Koenig and his crew.

Addressing Captain Koenig, President Lohmann of the Ocean company, said:

"With special joy, I repeat that all true Americans who are not doing mammoth service to England, all Americans of the free beliefs of Washington and Franklin, greeted the arrival of the Deutschland with warm admiration."

Lohmann referred to the fact that the Deutschland traveled 8,200 miles below and beside the English fleet.
