CHEAP POWER For Klamath Falls

TO THE PUBLIC:

Tonight at the regular meeting of the city council, the Keno Power Company will petition for a franchise to distribute electricity for commercial purposes throughout the streets of the city. Everyone interested in cheap power for Klamath Falls should be at the meeting. If the franchise fails of passage the city will be denied the benefits to come from a cheap water power development, and will at the same time throttle the development of thousands of horse power which are available in this section.

The Keno Power Company proposes to operate at the rates under which many of the business men of Klamath Falls signed contracts two years ago, consequently we believe the majority are in favor of a competing company, so we are prepared to go before the voters and abide by their decision.

We have made a bona fide investment in this county with the view of entering the Klamath Falls field. Our territory now is fully developed as regards pumping and lighting, consequently we have to seek a new outlet for our power. We believe, as developers of the country districts, we are entitled to at least a part of the city load. This is all we are asking for, but we need your co-operation to get it, as the opposition has developed to such an extent that the business men will have to express their views before the franchise will be granted.

The franchise asked for has been written by the Public Service Commission of Oregon, and safeguards the interests of the public in all ways. Briefly as follows:

Rates to be subject to change by city council. All damage to streets, etc., caused by construction work to be paid for by Keno Power Company. Franchise cannot be sold without the approval of city council.

This last section provides competing power in Klamath Falls as long as the city desires. We believe it to be to the interest of the city that such be the case, so are entering in good faith in regard to this. Ask your councilmen how they stand on this, and their reasons.

nied that he sold out before the game. He said:

"I never purposely threw a ball game in my life, and never intend to. I did not see the parties who are charged with buying me, nor did I even know there was more than one bet on the game."

"I freely admit that I didn't pitch the kind of ball I am capable of when feeling right. I had been sick for three days before the game, and in the fourth inning yesterday told the management I wasn't right. I pitched the best ball yesterday I could."

The crowd that saw the game yesterday was the largest that has filled Modoc Park this season. They saw a good ball game, featured by much heavy hitting by both sides, and much brilliant fielding. The work of Tucker Johnson, Cowan, Kear and Lilly in the field was sensational. That of Burns also was good.

Despite the victory for Weed, the visitors made but twelve hits to fourteen by Klamath Falls. The victory is explained by the fact that Weed got its hits in pinches, while Klamath Falls could not crack the pellet when men were on.

Weed's run getting commenced in the first inning, when Cowan hit one between short and third and scored on Lilly's three bagger to right center. In the third the visitors made two more on hits by Sheehy, Lilly, Kaer and Burns. Four were made in the sixth session, when Nelson walked, Anthony hit through the infield, Carman threw wild to third, Sheehy lived on a wild throw by Bogart, and Lilly homered over the ditch bank. In the eighth two more were annexed when Sheehy walked, Cowan hit past third, Johnson dropped a fly and Burns clouted one over the short right field fence.

Klamath started off well enough by making one in the first stanza on hits by Johnson, Carman and Bogart. Four were added in the fourth on two er-

rors by Nelson and hits by Bigbee, McKeffer, J. Johnson, Clarke and T. Johnson. Bowden scored the sixth run in the seventh inning by hitting over second, stealing second and a nice crack by Bogart.

J. Johnson, Bogart and Lilly were the batting heroes of the day, each being credited with three safe blows. Lilly got the only home run. Both he and Bigbee got a three bagger.

The game yesterday probably was the last one this season. Some of the boys are going away, and no more games are scheduled. This leaves the championship of Southern Oregon and Northern California in dispute, both Weed and Klamath Falls having a claim to it. A third game between these teams to settle the title is not expected.
