SERIOUS RIOTING IN SOFIA TODAY

880,000 RUMANIANS ARE ON INVASION OF AUSTRIA—ADVANCE GUARDS ALREADY HAVE CROSSED THE LINE

LONDON, Aug. 28.—Rome reports serious rioting in Sofia today. It is unconfirmedly reported that German and Turkish officers have been assassinated.

Italian critics say that Austria is evacuating Albania and Montenegro as a result of the Rumanian situation.

LONDON, Aug. 28.—A wireless from Bucharest says the Rumanians have successfully attacked the whole Teutonic front.

Eighty thousand Rumanians are en route to the Transylvania frontier to invade Austria. Advance guards already have crossed the line.

CARMAN DENIES CHARGES MADE TO RAISE METAL FROM TULE LAKE

SMILING OUTFIELDER SAYS ANY STATEMENT TO THE EFFECT THAT HE DID NOT PLAY HIS BEST IS FALSE

Complete denial that he in any way tried or did throw the ball game Sunday to Weed, or did not play the best he could, was made last night by Fred Carman, outfielder for the Klamath Falls team.

"I have played baseball for fifteen years, and never did I fail to do the best I could," said Carman. "I did not know the man who won heavily on Weed Sunday, and never talked with him in my life. It will be remembered that I got two hits in five times up, and lined out balls that were handled only by spectacular fielding. Any charges whatsoever that I did not play my best are false.

Lyle Bigbee, pitcher, last night repeated the denial to the charges against him. His denial was printed in yesterday's Herald.

The following statement regarding the game Sunday was made this morning by Manager Ray Watts:

"It is true that Lyle Bigbee informed me during Sunday's game that he was not himself, but as John Johnston had a sore arm and could not work I decided to take a chance on Lyle pulling through. At no time during the game did he express himself to either Captain Bowdin or myself as wanting to be relieved, but on the contrary he seemed confident he could win, even in his weakened condition.

"Some of the fans have asked me how to account for Bigbee's poor batting. I will go on record as stating that if Anthony could always put as much on the ball as he did when Bigbee faced him, that he could be winning games in the Pacific Coast League.

Director Fred Houston and I had a talk with Bigbee and Carman last night, and their stories rang true. We have been unable to trace these charges directly to any reliable source.

"Notwithstanding the criticism of some of the fans, I firmly believe that if we had received our share of the breaks we would have won Sunday's game. Time and a gain Weed cut off hits that should have gone for hits in most any league."

TO RAISE METAL FROM TULE LAKE

BIG MAGNET HAS BEEN MADE TO RAISE PUMP, PIPE AND OTHER THINGS SUNK IN THE LAKE LAST YEAR

Several feet of steel pipe, a pump and numerous other articles used in drilling and pumping, now at the bottom of Tule Lake, are to be raised by the reclamation service. A powerful magnet has been made by the blacksmith and machine shop of the service for this work. It is planned to drop the magnet into the lake and raise the articles with it.

The many pieces of metal to be raised went to the bottom of Tule Lake last year, when a barge on which they were used sunk. The articles are valuable, and can be used after being scoured and rust removed. The work of raising them will be supervised by Engineer Shadler of the reclamation service.

The articles were being used when the service was drilling in Tule Lake in hopes of forcing an outlet for the lake into the lava beds.

New Electric Ordinance.

The city council last evening directed City Attorney Groesbeck and the light committee of the council to draft a new ordinance governing electrical inspection. It was ordered that the new ordinance shall require all places in Klamath Falls using electricity to conform to the underwriters qualification for insurance.

Other sawmills and several logging camps are still asking for men, but cannot get them. Before it stopped running nights the Pelican Bay Lumber company advertised in the papers and through cardboard posters that it wanted men, but to no avail.

Strahorn Tells Portland of Railroad Prospects

ath country is adding new soil to its agricultural resources, especially the drainage of Tule Lake by evaporation, now that Lost River has been diverted so as no longer to flow into the lake. Three thousand acres were made available last season, and a plan is afoot to remove the remaining water by pumping. As fast as the lake waters recede thrifty farmers are opening up the soil for crops—farmers mostly of Bohemian antecedents, who are making their own bonny-fated endeavors richly felt. As for the settlement that is going on in the face of uncertainties of transportation, Mr. Strahorn said the records of the Lakeview land office show an annual filing of 1,000 people, or about three per day, applying for government lands in Crook, Lake and Klamath counties.

The government's task of draining lands in Klamath, besides private and semi-public projects involving many marshes, has brought out additional lands which before long will come under the plow.
