Root Suggests Weeding Out Numerous Lawyers

CHICAGO, Aug. 30.—President Elihu Root of the American Bar Association pleaded for a weeding out of the unnecessary and incompetent among the 114,000 lawyers in the United States in his annual address at the opening of the meeting of that organization here today.

"It is true of the American people generally," said Mr. Root, "that too many of us have been trying to get something out of the country, and too few of us have been trying to serve it."

Pursuing his plea for efficiency in the administration of the law upon the statement that we must get down to brass tacks in all our affairs if we're going to keep pace with Europe after the war, Mr. Root flayed our "cumbrous machinery of justice," and called upon the lawyers to forget their selfishness and give the country a little service, not only in law administration, but in law making. He said that as a rule only the youngest and least experienced lawyers get into our law making bodies, local, state and national. Concerning the law and the lawyers, Mr. Root said in part:

"There is great economic waste in the administration of the law in state and nation. We spend vast sums in building court houses, paying judges, clerks and others, and the product in justice is disproportionate to the plant and working force. There is no country in the world where the doing of justice is burdened by such heavy overhead charges. It all causes an enormous waste of time on the part of witnesses, jury panel and parties."

"The ease with which admission to the bar is secured in many jurisdictions and the attraction of a career which affords a living without manual labor has crowded the bar with more lawyers than are necessary. Of the 114,000 lawyers in the United States, a very considerable part are not needed. If that business were conducted like the business of any great industrial or transportation company which is striving for the highest efficiency at the least cost in order to compete successfully with its rivals, a very considerable percentage of the 114,000 would be discharged."

"Why do these defects exist in our administration of justice? The American people are not quarrelsome or litigious. They are good natured, practical, simple and direct in their methods."

ods, respectors of law and honest in their dealings. Our bar as a whole is courageous, loyal and able. I think the underlying cause is that unconsciously we all treat the business of administering justice as something to be done for private benefit, instead of for the public service."

Mr. Root admitted that our basic law should be redrafted, but, he added, "none but a prophet or seer could do it, and none such was available."

Committees on judicial reform will report tomorrow morning, and Mr. Root's address may form part of the basis of discussion on these reports. Stephen S. Gregory of Illinois, former president of the association, will preside at the evening session today. Former President Frederick W. Lehmann of Missouri will preside tomorrow morning, and former President St. George Tucker of Virginia tomorrow evening.

The meeting will close with the annual dinner of the association Friday night.

COUNTY DEMURS TO JOHN IRWIN

Rumania's Entrance in War Means Turn in Tide

NEW YORK, Aug. 30.—Rumania's entrance into the European conflict emphasizes as its most significant fact the judgment of the Bucharest government that the tide of war is turning, at least in the eastern battle area.

Rumania has waited with unusual patience for two years before deciding the central empires cannot gain a victory in the Balkans; and the information in possession of Bucharest authorities must now be fairly conclusive, or the old policy of caution would continue to dictate Rumania's attitude.

Rumania's limitation of her declaration of war to Austria-Hungary is a bold bid to Bulgaria to remain passive before Rumania's territorial ambitions.

In effect, it is an intimation to the Bulgars that Rumania will not interfere with Bulgarian designs against Serbia, if the Bulgars do not hamper Rumania's desire to conquer the Hungarian province of Transylvania. The central empires will bring strong pressure to bear on Bulgaria to reject this proposal, but there is a chance that the Bulgars will play their hand very cautiously.

There is no present possibility that Rumania's entrance into the war will open the Dardanelles and permit Russian grain to relieve the world's scarcity of food stuffs. The Rumanians will not venture upon a roundabout campaign against Turkey, and even though Turkey declares war against Rumania the latter's attitude must be a defensive one against the Moslems. It is not probable that Rumania for the present will engage in a major offensive anywhere except against Transylvania. There is a large Rumanian population in Transylvania, and by directing all effort in this single direction, the Rumanian campaign will gather impetus through enthusiasm of racial rescue work.

The chief advantage of Rumania's entrance will go to Russia. The principal victim will be Hungary, whether in loss of territory or loss of men. Efforts to arrange a separate peace by

the Hungarian government are by no means an impossible development of the situation.
