SNEEZERS WILL TALK OF CAESAR

MEMBERS OF NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF HAYFEVERITES BLOW INTO BETHLEHEM BEHIND THEIR HANDKERCHIEFS

BETHLEHEM, N. H., Aug. 31.—Several hundred members of the United States Hay Fever Association blew in here today behind their handkerchiefs. They came for the annual national convention representing 200,000 hayfeverites. There is an organization not to be sneezed at by anyone but members.

The official slogan of the convention is a quotation from a funeral oration by the original hay fever victim, Marc Antony, wherein he said: "You who have tears to shed, prepare to shed them now."

It has long been generally believed that Antony was exhorting his hearers to weep over the death of Caesar, but the association's research department, under the direction of President John H. Pinover of Brooklyn, has definitely established that Antony merely interrupted himself to warn his fellow sufferers of the hay fever season's approach.

Mr. Pinover here today also expressed the suspicion that there was, really, no such man as Caesar, that his name, as a matter of fact, was Sneezer, which, of course, explains what Antony meant when he said: "I come to bury Sneezer; not to praise him."

"Moreover," said Mr. Pinover, talking the situation over, "there are additional proofs in Antony's oration to prove my contention. In saying 'when that the poor have cried, Sneezer hath wept,' Antony was simply trying to show that Sneezer suffered from hay fever just the same as ordinary persons, only in an accentuated form."

"Too much for words," said the mayor, "I wish," said Mayor Albee, at his desk in the city hall this morning, "that some of these politicians could see Crater Lake."

"And why, Mr. Mayor, would you like some of these politicians to see Crater Lake?" asked Private Secretary Warren, who had been delegated to act as interlocutor.

"Because," said his honor, "it would be one thing about which they would have nothing to say."

Mayor and Mrs. Albee returned Saturday from a motor trip that took them through the Hood River Valley, Central Oregon to Crater Lake, down Rogue River, through the Rogue River Valley and the Willamette Valley, and home.

"It was the first real vacation I'd had since I took this job," said the mayor, "and Mrs. Albee and I thoroughly enjoyed it. The fates were kind to us, and we had the minimum of troubles, or none at all, with our car."

"The Albees were delighted with everything they saw on the trip, and particularly with Crater Lake, about which they have nothing whatever to say."

"It's too much for words," said the mayor.

"Let's hang the best pictures we can say it is unpleasantly warm throughout," said Secretary Warren.—Journal.
