

GREECE IS READY TO JOIN THE ALLIES PEACE COMMISSIONERS BEGIN SESSIONS TODAY

CLAIMED GREEK TROOPS DISLIKE WAR ON AUSTRIA

ALLIES RESUME THE OFFENSIVE ON SOMME

ZEPPELINS AGAIN RAID LONDON AT NIGHT

Rumanians Have Captured Much Transylvania Territory, According to Bucharest—Bulgarians, Aided by Germans, Attacking Along Extensive Front and Are Bombarding Two Rumanian Cities.

PARIS, Sept. 4.—The Greeks have accepted all the demands of the allies, and at once will begin operations against the central powers.

BERLIN, Sept. 4.—Despite the fact that a majority of the Greek troops do not want to fight the Germans, it is expected that Greece will enter the war on the side of the allies as soon as her army is completely mobilized.

Military authorities believe that because the Greeks are entering the war against Germany only with reluctance, they will be ineffective fighters, and will not materially aid the allies cause.

PARIS, Sept. 4.—The French and English today resumed the offensive on the Somme River along a six mile front. The allies line has been straightened out.

The French are on the outskirts of Cambes, and have captured LeForest, Clerly and Sursumme.

The British gained today east of Moquet farm, and captured a part of Clinchy.

LONDON, Sept. 4.—Zeppelins raided London Saturday night, dropping bombs on several places. One of the raiders was shot down and destroyed.

PARIS, Sept. 4.—Bad weather is interfering slightly with the new allied offensive along the Somme. The French are improving their positions. There have been no attempts by the Germans since Saturday to recapture lost positions.

BUCHAREST, Sept. 4.—The Rumanians have occupied the entire country of Haromsask, in Transylvania, and the regions about Sekell and Berok heights.

The Germans and Bulgarians are attacking along the entire Dobrudja frontier, but have been repulsed south of Bazargio.

The enemy is bombarding Islaz and Calafatu.

CREASED OPERATING COST

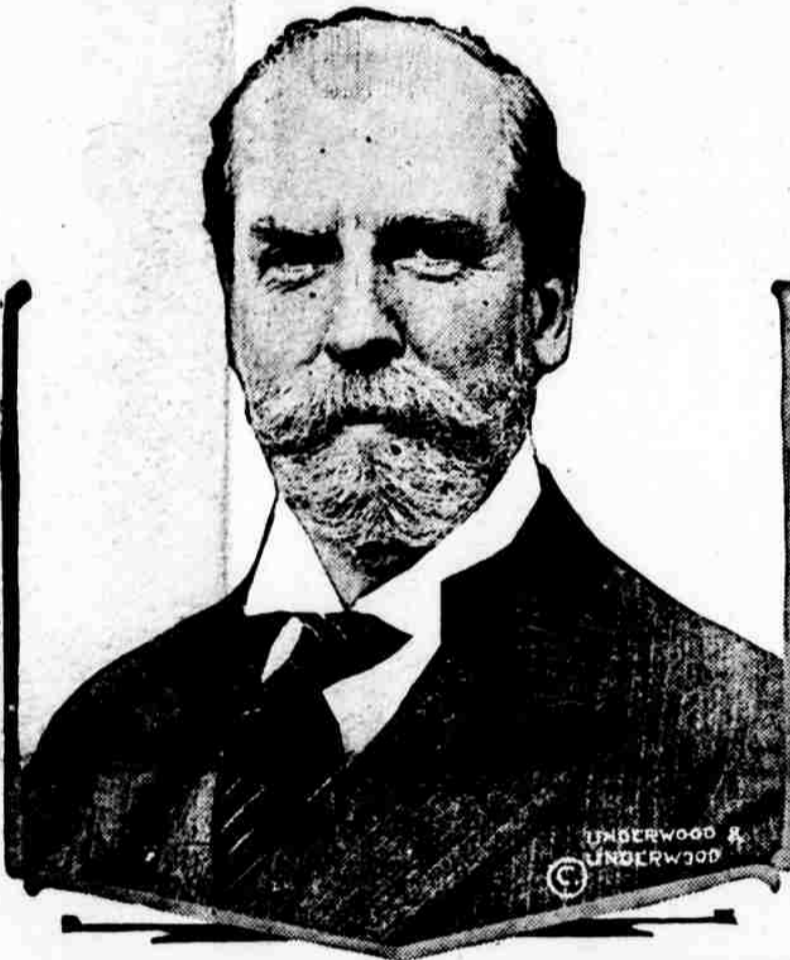

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 4.—Senator Reed today introduced in the senate a resolution directing the Interstate Commerce Commission to investigate the question of whether the operating cost of the railroads of the United States will be increased as a result of the Adamson bill, compelling an eight hour day.

The railroads claim that the shorter day will add thousands of dollars to the operating cost, and used this argument against an eight hour day. They tried to get assurances that the Interstate Commerce Commission would grant increases if the work day was reduced to eight hours.

LANSING EXPECTS PEACE TO RESULT

ESPEE BUILDS 4,000 NEW CARS

ARE BEING CONSTRUCTED TO RELIEVE THE SHORTAGE IN OREGON AND CALIFORNIA OF CARS TO MOVE CROPS AND LUMBER

To relieve the shortage of box cars in California and Oregon, the Southern Pacific has ordered the construction of 4,000 new cars. On September 1st, 300 of these cars were delivered, and are now available to shippers on the Southern Pacific lines.

The 4,000 box cars are being manufactured by an Eastern firm, and are being sent to the West empty, the Southern Pacific paying the freight from the East. Ordinarily new or old cars from the East are not sent West until loaded, but the Southern Pacific is rushing the new cars West empty that they may reach shippers sooner.

SESSIONS WILL BE HELD ABOARD
MAYFLOWER

Secretary of State Says to Reach Permanent Solution Relations of State to Individual and Individual to State Must Be Investigated—Says This is the Opportunity for Which America Has Been Looking.

NEW YORK, Sept. 4.—Addressing the Mexican and American members of the joint commission appointed to settle the border troubles, Secretary of State Robert Lansing today drafted a permanent, not merely a temporary, solution to the border problem.

He said to reach such a settlement that it would be necessary to go to the root of the matter, and consider the relation of the individual to the state, as well as the relation of the state to the individual.

He told the Mexican members that the American government has anxiously watched the revolutions in Mexico, and sought to be patient and wait for a time when approaches for peace would afford a favorable opportunity to adjust all difficulties.

"That day at last has arrived. The present conference is a realization of our expectations. I look forward to its accomplishment with assurance that it will settle the questions causing irritation between the two governments," said Secretary Lansing.

Most of the conference will be held aboard the Mayflower, President Wilson's private yacht, which is here ready to sail for the first session this afternoon.
