STOCKMEN FORM

A PARTNERSHIP

To do a general bauiness of growing, buying and selling beef cattle, Luke E. Walker and D. M. McLemore have formed a partnership. Both are known as men of means and as experts in the livestock business. Mr. Walker will reside in Klamath Falls and conduct the Klamath end of the businesss and Mr. McLemore will reside in San Francisco and handle the California end.

Messrs. Walker and McLemore own considerable land in California, and have leased a large acreage in Wood River Valley. This fall they intend to buy about 4,000 or 5,000 stock cattle in Klamath county and Nevada. Fifteen hundred of these will be fed n Klamath and about 3,000 in California.

The new firm expects to make its first shipment of beef September 14th
