## HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

SOME very proper advice is given by Principal Williams of the Sacramento high school in an appeal to parents urging simplicity of dress for both boys and girls. "This advice could be followed to good advantage in Klamath Falls. Mr. Williams says: "May we urge upon the parents the desirability of simplicity in dress, both for boys and girls? This is a public school, maintained for the children of all the people.

"It ill becomes any boy or girl to make himself conspicuous by overdress. It is not generous to make the poorer child feel that the school is not for him, because he cannot appear so well as his more fortunate fellow student.

"A good, healthy American girlhood does not need jewelry and cosmetics to make herself attractive."

Too many social activities for the high school student are also opposed by Williams, who warns parents to watch the associations formed by their children. He says:

"Take an interest in your child's social life. The high school age is generally that in which the desire for social intercourse with his fellows begins to be most strongly felt. Watch your child's associates. Learn where he spends his hours out of school.

"The cigarette and the poolrooms are insidious foes. All moving picture shows are not good for boys and girls. Don't let his desire for social pleasures keep him from preparing his lessons. Parties should be limited to nights not followed by a school day.

"Look after your child's health. High school boys and girls are only boys and girls, and should keep early hours. But play, good hard physical play, should be part of the daily program of every boy and girl. We recognize this need in requiring physical training of all as a part of the high school course."

## JAPANESE GO TO SOUTH AMERICA

LABORERS AND GIRLS, UNWELCOMED TO UNITED STATES, SEEK SOUTH REPUBLICS AS PLACE TO MOVE TO

TOKYO, Sept. 7.—Emigration of Japanese to South American points is increasing by leaps and bounds, as the result of the "gentlemen's agreement" with the United States limiting the number of Orientals permitted to enter North America, according to statistics available today.

With a passenger list that broke all records in the transportation of Oriental emigrants, the Kiyo Maru recently sailed from Yokohama for South American ports. Of the 931 stowage passengers, practically all were emigrants. This is said to be the largest number of stowage passengers that ever crossed the Pacific in a single boat.

Brazil appears to be the most attractive South American country to the Japanese. A large number were bound for Argentine, however. The Kiyo Maru also carried forty-five young Japanese girls on their way to South America to become the brides of Japanese farmers already located there. They were selected by a Kobe marriage agency from nearly 200 applicants.

English Transport Sinking in Thames

LONDON, Sept. 7.—The Canadian Pacific liner Montreal is sinking in the Thames as a result of a collision with a warship. No details are available.

The Montreal was 409 feet long, and recently was used as a transport to bring Canadian troops to France.
