FLOUR GOES UP 15 CENTS SACK

ADVANCE WAS ANNOUNCED YESTERDAY—BEST GRADE NOW IS \$2.10 A SACK AND CHEAPEST IS \$1.75 A SACK

Flour, that stuff from which the staff of life is made, took an advance of 15 cents a sack, or 50 cents a barrel yesterday. This rise applies to all grades of flour.

If you want to make bread from Anchor flour, the cheapest grade, a sack will cost you \$1.75. Crater Lake will cost \$1.90, Drifted Snow and Blue Ribbon \$2.10. In each case this is an increase of 15 cents over the retail figure of last Monday.

That a further advance in flour would not be surprising was intimated by a prominent local grocer this morning.
