

# VENIZELOS STARTS GREEK REVOLUTION

## WOULD FORCE GREECE INTO WAR AGAINST GERMANS

### ALLIES WIN IN ALL PARTS OF BALKANS

#### GREEK REVOLUTION NOW IN CONTROL OF CRETE

Rumanians Capture 6,000 Prisoners in Transylvanian Fighting and Progress Along Danube—Both Wings of Serbian Forces Storm Bulgarian Defenses Near Monastir. Artillery Marks Somme Fight

LONDON, Sept. 25.—Athens unconfirmably reports that Premier Venizelos is at Salonika, and is heading a revolution which seeks to overthrow the Constantine government and precipitate the entrance of Greece into the war against Germany.

ATHENS, Sept. 25.—Following the occupation of Canea and Heracleon the revolutionists have gained control of Crete. The garrisons have surrendered and joined the insurgents.

PARIS, Sept. 25.—In the last two days the allies have won important victories in practically every sector of the Macedonian fighting. Advancing the entire left wing, the British have successfully attacked Janina. The French took trenches west of Struma and progressed northwest of Florina. The Serbians advanced north of Krusograd and the Russians captured fortified hill No. 916.

BUCHAREST, Sept. 25.—In the last twenty-four hours the Rumanians have captured 6,900 prisoners north of the northwestern Transylvanian front. They also have progressed along the Danube and at Dobrudja.

ROME, Sept. 25.—The Russians and Rumanians have resumed the offensive at Vulcan Pass and retain the initiative at Dobrudja. East of the Vardar the allies have been repulsed. Both wings of the Serbian forces are advancing, and this morning began a storming of the Bulgarian defenses south of Kenall, not far from Monastir.

BERLIN, Sept. 25.—The Germans penetrated the Russian positions in Galicia, but later were rejected. The Russian attacks north of Halits resulted unsuccessfully for the offensive forces. The Serbian attacks on Kamachanog have collapsed. Zeppelins last night bombarded Bucharest. Rumanian attacks on Saurzuk and Vulcan Pass have failed.

LONDON, Sept. 25.—in the western fighting German counters against the new British positions on the Somme continue. Counters east of Courcellette have been successfully repulsed by the British. The Somme fighting is featured by violent artillery duelling. Berlin admits the loss of two Zeppelins in the raid Saturday night on the British positions.

### MILK WAGON MEN JOIN STRIKERS; 180,000 READY

ALL UNION MEN WILL BE CALLED OUT, SAY LEADERS

With 180,000 already Agreed on Striking and 350,000 Others Prepared to Quit Executives of Unions Believe Impression Will Be Made Without Help of All Union Men of New York—Arbitration Board Meets

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—Executives of the transportation unions are busy today arranging the details for the walkout Wednesday morning.

With 180,000 members of the carmen agreed on a walkout Wednesday, leaders say 350,000 men connected with other transportation enterprises may quit work. The leaders declare this number will have such a tremendous effect that there will be no need to call out other union men. The public is hopeful that tomorrow's session of the state board of arbitration will bring adjustment of the trouble.

Milk wagon drivers gave notice today that they will walk out Wednesday unless their wages are increased.

### BOARD CREATES 3 NEW SCHOOLS

TO BE LOCATED IN BARNES VALLEY, NEAR BONANZA AND LA PINE—COUNTY NOW HAS 52 SCHOOL DISTRICTS

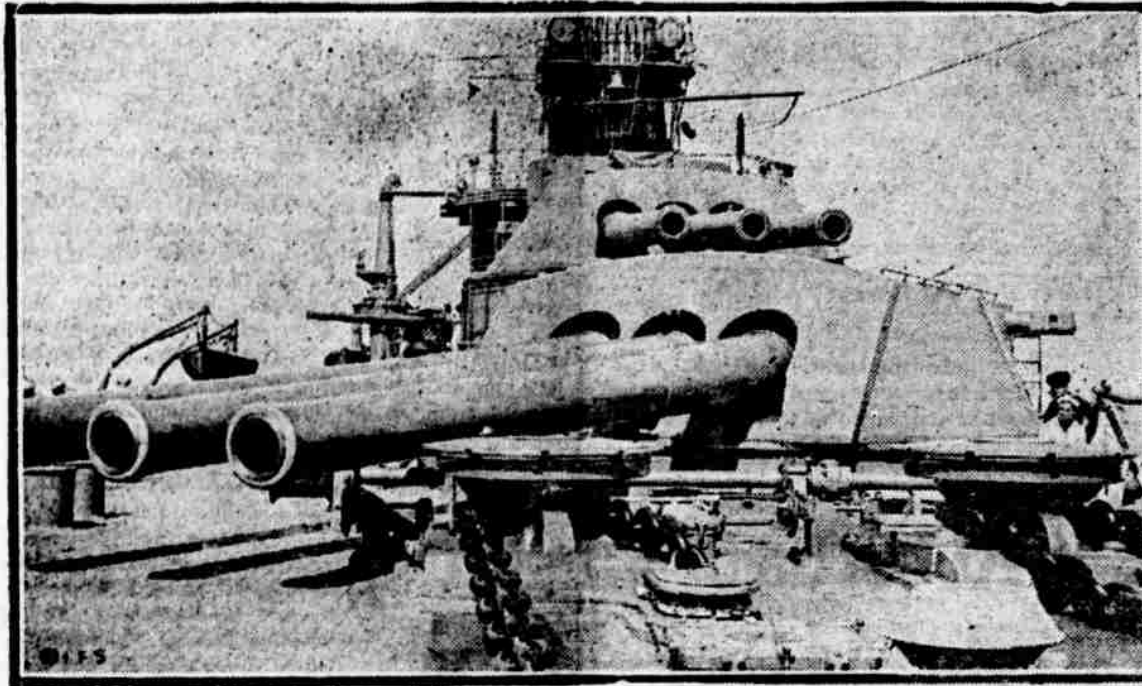
Three new school districts were created Saturday when the county boundary board met in the chambers of the county court. Number 50 will be the official title of one of the new districts, and is in Barnes Valley, in the extreme eastern part of the county.

District Number 51, the second created, will be near LaPine in the extreme northern part of the county, and not far from Crescent. The third new district is Number 52, and is about five miles north of Bonanza, near the George Maxwell place. There are now 52 school districts in Klamath county.

The county boundary board is composed of County Judge Marion Hanks and County Commissioners F. H. McCornack, John Hagelstein and Superintendent Peterson.

### Warship's 14-Inch Guns Hit Target Eleven Miles Away



These great 14-inch rifles of the United States battleship Pennsylvania scored five targets out of twelve shots at a distance of 20,000 yards in Chesapeake Bay. That record may make her the most formidable battleship in the world, not excepting the five British battleships of the Warspite and Queen Elizabeth class, which carry 15-inch guns. The target was the sunken hulk of the San Marcos, formerly the battleship Texas, which lies off Tanger Found in the Chesapeake.

### HUMPHREY WILL GET STOLEN CAR

OAKLAND SIX IS RECOVERED BELOW DUNSMUIR AND THIEVES ARE ARRESTED AND PLACED IN JAIL AT YREKA

George Humphrey is expected home from Yreka with the Oakland Six touring car stolen from him at Crescent on the night of September 17th. The men who stole the car were apprehended Saturday evening below Dunsmuir, and have been returned to Yreka and placed in jail.

The arrest came about through Lloyd Alford seeing the car in Dunsmuir and immediately notifying the authorities.

It is understood that the two men will not be returned to Klamath Falls, but will be tried in Yreka for cracking the safe in the postoffice at Macdonald Friday night.

Although it has not been proved, it is suspected that the same men robbed the jewelry store at Merrill a few nights previous.

### BILLINGS FOUND GUILTY IN FIRST DEGREE BY JURY

LIFE IMPRISONMENT RECOMMENDATION IS IN VERDICT

Convicted of Placing Bomb That Killed Several People, Will Appeal Tomorrow for New Trial—Defense to Ask for Three Months' Continuance of Trial of Others Suspected of Complicity in Bomb Outrage.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 25.—Murder in the first degree was the verdict returned late Saturday afternoon by the jury in the case of Warren Billings, charged with murder through explosion of a bomb during the preparedness parade.

The jury recommended life imprisonment.

Billings and his attorney, Maxwell McNutt, today are preparing an appeal for a new trial. The appeal will be made tomorrow before Judge Lunn. At the same time McNutt will ask for a continuance of three months of the trial of Thomas Mooney and others charged with Billings as perpetrators of the bomb outrage. Mooney's trial is scheduled to begin tomorrow.

### Ex-Mayor of New York is Dead



Seth Low, aged 66, died after a long illness at his country home near New York city. He had been twice mayor of Brooklyn before consolidation with New York, for twelve years president of Columbia University, and once mayor of New York city.

### JURY FINDS FOR MRS. BENSINGER

A verdict for the plaintiff in the sum of \$90 was awarded by the jury Saturday evening in the case of Mrs. A. E. Bensinger against Stephen Herlihy. The plaintiff sued for \$90 as a balance due on a threshing machine. Kollo C. Groesbeck represented Mrs. Bensinger. The case was tried in Justice Gowen's court.

### LOW RAIDS WET JOINT; SEIZES BEER AND WINE

ITALIAN IS ARRESTED FOR BOOT-LEGGING AT PELICAN CITY

Sheriff Low Catches Bootlegger as He Arrives From Dorris With Load of Firewater—Grabs Stock Consisting of Six Cases of Beer, Four Kegs of "Dago Red," and Empty Beer Bottles and Glasses.

A bootlegging joint that has been doing business for some time was raided Saturday evening when Sheriff C. C. Low entered the home of A. Barni and wife at Pelican City. Four kegs of "dago red" wine, six cases of beer and several empty bottles were seized by Sheriff Low and Policeman H. S. Wilson, who arrested him.

Barni was placed under arrest and lodged last night in the county jail. Mrs. Barni, although charged in the information as an accomplice, was allowed her liberty because she is about to become a mother. This morning Barni was released on \$800 bonds, furnished by A. Comforti and Julius Joseph. The hearing is scheduled for 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon.

Barni and wife are charged with a misdemeanor and not with a felony, and hence will be tried before Justice E. W. Gowen.

Sheriff Low for some time has been aware of the fact that liquor was being dispensed at Pelican City, but postponed arrest of the traffickers until he could get concrete evidence on which he believed a conviction could be secured. Friday he saw two men from Pelican City in Klamath Falls drunk, and asked them where they obtained the liquor. They replied that they could get all they wanted at Pelican City, and were persuaded by Sheriff Low to return to the bootlegging joint and buy a bottle of whiskey and one of beer.

The men returned to Klamath Falls in about an hour with the wet goods, as per instructions.

After securing a search warrant Saturday from District Attorney John Irwin, Sheriff Low went to Barni's house and arrested Mrs. Barni. Soon afterwards Barni himself drove up to the front gate in an automobile, and was arrested by Sheriff Low. A search of the car was made, which disclosed that Barni was just returning from Dorris with six cases of beer and one keg of "dago red."

### CROSS BORDER; MEXICANS SHOOT

CAVALRYMEN WHO CROSSED RIO GRANDE WITHOUT AUTHORITY WILL FACE COURT MARTIAL, SAYS GENERAL FUNSTON

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 25.—General Frederick Funston has wired to the war department that he has ordered a court martial for the squad of Texas cavalrymen which crossed the Rio Grande yesterday without authority.

Mexicans fired on the party when it was across the border, and one horse was killed.
