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GREEK ULTIMATUM GOES TO SOFIA

Germany Expects War on Bulgaria in 3 Days

BULGARIANS IN MACEDONIA ARE REINFORCING

French Are Gradually Squeezing Out the Germans From Peronne, the Allied Objective in the Great Offensive—British Capture Fortified Farm After Five Days Continuous Assault, Says London

LONDON, Sept. 29.—It is understood that the Greek ultimatum to Bulgaria will go to Sofia today. It will demand immediate evacuation by the Bulgarian army of all Greek towns.

Amsterdam reports that Berlin expects the Greek declaration of war against Bulgaria to be made within three days. The Bulgarian army in Macedonia is heavily reinforcing.

PARIS, Sept. 29.—The French have advanced between Morval and Frenoy in the eastward swoop to squeeze the Germans out of the Peronne district.

LONDON, Sept. 29.—No halting in their five days' assault, the British this morning captured a fortified farm southwest of Lens.

Part of the trenches near the Schwaben redoubt have been cleared by British bombs. The Germans are bombarding the new British positions around Thiepval.

BERLIN, Sept. 29.—The allied offensive along the Somme has slackened and British attacks between Acre and Courcellette have been repulsed.

The Germans are progressing in Transylvania, near Hermanstadt. The Rumanians have been driven into the mountains.

TUETONS APPROVE HOLLWEG SPEECH

ARE BEHIND CHANCELLOR IN HIS STAND THAT ALLIES ARE CONTINUING WAR TO GAIN MORE TERRITORY

BERLIN, Sept. 29.—The people of Germany are enthusiastically approving the speech of Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg in the reichstag yesterday, when he blamed Germany enemies for the two years' continuation of the present European slaughter.

Chancellor Hollweg said the allies' motive for continuation of the war is territorial aggrandisement.

He referred to England as Germany's most "egotistic and bitterest enemy."

COOK CRUSHES WAITER'S HEAD WITH COFFEE POT

CHICAGO, Sept. 29.—Following a quarrel today in the kitchen of the Hampshire hotel, Angelo Cornelius, a cook, crushed a waiter's head with a coffee pot. He shot and wounded two policemen before the police fatally shot him.

WILSON TO TELL WHAT ARE ISSUES OF THE CAMPAIGN

WILL ENUNCIATE THEM IN FUTURE SPEECHES

Names Business, Preparedness, Peace, Prosperity and Adamson Bill—Is in Good Health, and Anxious to Get Into West for Votes—Hughes is Enthusiastically Greeted in All Cities He Visits in New York

ASHBURY PARK, N. J., Sept. 29. Peace, prosperity, business preparedness and the Adamson eight hour bill will be enunciated as the four chief issues of the present campaign by Woodrow Wilson in his future speeches, according to announcement made here today.

The president is in good health and eager to start on the western campaign. His wife will accompany him.

ONEONTA, N. Y., Sept. 29.—Charles E. Hughes in his New York campaign is traveling the same trails he traveled when he campaigned the state for governor.

Everywhere he is enthusiastically greeted.

He continues to assail the democratic record of the last four years. In his speech here today Hughes declared that he was in favor of the "general principle of an eight hour day," but declared the Adamson bill to be a surrender to the railroad brotherhoods' strike threat.

WITHROW GETS NEW LAND JOB

WILL HELP CLASSIFY CALIFORNIA-OREGON GRANT LANDS. LEAVES SOON TO BEGIN NEW WORK IN TIMBER

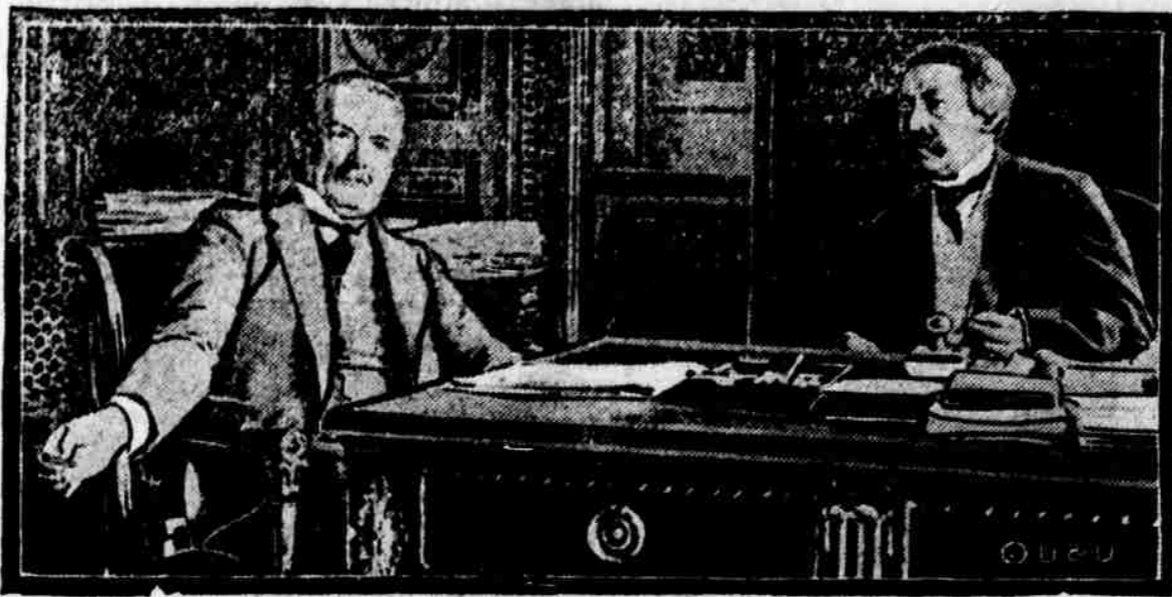
Because of his familiarity with lands in Klamath county and other parts of Southern Oregon, and his ability as an abstractor, Bert E. Withrow has been given a position with the crew of men that is classifying the California-Oregon railroad grant lands. Mr. Withrow has accepted, and leaves soon for the camp in Jackson county to begin work.

It is expected that the work of classifying the grant lands will require about two years, but the men now working will have to stop in December or earlier.

Mr. Withrow has not severed his connection with the Klamath County Abstract company, but is merely taking a little vacation from the office work for a few months.

City is Captured By Bandit Chief

CUSHIUIRICCHIC, 50 MILES FROM CHIHUAHUA, FALLS

Carranzista Officials Admit Their Losses Were Heavy, But Say Carranza's Tormentor Also Suffered Loss—Details Come From Mining Camps Nearby, and Are Meagre, But Believed Authentic.

LE PASO, Tex., Sept. 29.—Federal agents learned today that Villa has decisively defeated the Carranzista army at Cushiuiricchic, and has captured the city.

Cushiuiricchic is fifty miles west of Chihuahua City. The Carranzistas admit that they lost heavily in the battle, but insist that Villa's losses also were heavy. The battle began Wednesday morning, and the city fell last night. Details of the fighting are meagre, and are coming mainly from nearby mining camps.

ARMED MEXICANS ARE SURPRISED

WERE HIDING ON AMERICAN SOIL AND FLED WHEN CAVALRYMEN APPROACHED—CARBINE TAKEN AT CARRIZAL

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 29.—General Funston reported to the war department today that thirty armed Mexicans were discovered this morning hiding this side of the international border. They were found a short distance west of Yaleta, Texas. When United States cavalrymen approached the Mexicans fled.

One dropped a carbine taken at the massacre of the Tenth cavalry troop at Carrizal. No shots had been fired from it.

POLISH WOMEN CONTINUE FIGHT

GATHER IN BUFFALO TO DISCUSS METHODS OF SENDING FOOD AND SUPPLIES TO THEIR FAMISHED COUNTRY

BUFFALO, N. Y., Sept. 29.—Leading Polish women of America are gathered here to discuss ways and means of continuing the campaign to secure permission from the ruling European powers to allow food and other relief to be sent from the United States to starving Poland.

The failure of a personal appeal by President Wilson to the belligerent powers, made for the Polish Women's Alliance and other Polish organizations, did not discourage the women gathered here.

An entire week will be devoted by the delegates of the Polish Women's Alliance of America, in annual convention, in formulating plans they hope finally will result in breaking the blockade against Polish relief.

Mrs. Ignaz Paderewski, wife of the famous pianist, who has been working unceasingly for the last year in behalf of her people, is here to address the delegates, representing 18,000 women.

Unions Admit Walkout Failure

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—Admitting that the transportation unions have failed to secure a walkout of all members, the strike leaders plan to call a new meeting of all unions Monday to arrange a general strike, if possible.

Others predict that at the meeting Monday the walkout plan will be definitely abandoned.

Those union workmen who are now striking insist that the fight against the street car companies is still on. The police believe that danger of trouble is over, but are continuing their vigilance.

JAPAN WILL BE OUR MAIN RIVAL

UNITED STATES STEEL MAGNATE SAYS JAPAN IS FRIENDLY, BUT WILL GIVE HIS COUNTRY HARD COMPETITION

CHICAGO, Sept. 29.—Judge E. H. Gary of the United States Steel corporation, who arrived today from Japan, says Japan is very friendly to America, but that after the European war will be this country's leading commercial competitor.

He declared that sons of Nippon are taking up the manufacturing of clothing, and will send into the world markets goods that will make a good bid.

SAY VILLA MAY ATTACK JAUREZ NEXT WEDNESDAY

CARRANZISTAS TELL FRIENDS TO LEAVE TUESDAY

Villa Has Boasted That He Would "Drive the Whole Garrison into the River"—Theaters are closed Early, Streets Are Patrolled and Citizens Must Be in Homes by 10 at Night or Be Executed by Soldiers.

JAUREZ, Sept. 29.—The warning being given today by Carranzistas, telling all their friends to leave Jaurez by next Tuesday, is causing the belief that Villa intends to attack this city Wednesday.

If the bandit king does attack Jaurez he will be executing his threat to "drive the whole garrison into the river."

Carranzista officials are closing local theaters early, and have announced that anyone out of his home after 10 o'clock at night will be executed. Troops are patrolling the streets.

There is a wild rumor that part of the Carranza garrison is ready to desert to Villa when he reaches here Wednesday.

LAVA BEDS ROAD IS TALKED TODAY

NORTHERN CALIFORNIA COUNTIES TODAY ARE DISCUSSING THIS ROAD AND ALSO ROAD DOWN THE KLAMATH

ALTURAS, Calif., Sept. 29.—Work that has been carried on in each of the five counties will be outlined at today's session of the annual convention of the Northern California Counties Association, the big booster meeting which has drawn over 200 delegates here from Northern California and Southern Oregon. This will be in the form of addresses by representatives of each county.

In addition, plans for the furthering of the development of the northern district and plans for highways will be discussed. This is also the day set for the election of officers for the ensuing year.

A projected road down the Klamath river, connecting with Humboldt Bay, a road connecting with Klamath county, Oregon via the scenic Modoc Lava Beds, employment of convict labor in road construction, and cooperative work of other character by the counties will receive attention, including extensive irrigation projects.

Today's session completes the business session of the Northern Counties Association, which in its year of existence has proven itself a potent factor in advancing the interests of this region. Tonight, a grand ball will be given in honor of the visitors, and tomorrow, an auto trip will be made through the Surprise Valley, stopping at Surprise Valley and Cedarville for the day.
