BERLIN, Oct. 2.—Budapest dispatches say the German victory at Hermannstadt has halted the entire Rumanian invasion of Transylvania.

The Rumanian losses have necessitated a regrouping of all the Rumanian forces on the Transylvania. The Rumanians have invaded Bulgaria, crossing the Danube south of Bucharest near Ruscuk, the strongest of the Bulgarian fortresses.

PARIS, Oct. 2.—Using the French monitors on the canals effectively, the French have just finished a bombardment of Mount St. Quentin, dominating Peronne from the east.

The French are steadily encircling Peronne.

LONDON, Oct. 2.—Ten Zeppelins, one of them a super-Zeppelin, raided London last night. The super-Zeppelin was downed, and its commander found alive, but frightfully mangled.

The bodies of thirteen of the crew have been recovered. Wreckage was strewn over a wide area where the air fighter struck the ground.

The crowd which witnessed the battle cheered wildly after the raider plunged burning to the ground.

In the fighting on the continent the British are consolidating their lines advancing behind "tank" cars. They have crossed two highways leading to Bapaume.

The British losses are small.

President to Dedicate Greatest Dam



Elephant Butte dam, which will be formally dedicated by President Wilson October 14th, is the largest irrigation dam built under the direction of the United States reclamation service, and the largest mass of masonry in the world. It is 1,250 feet long, with a maximum width of 215 feet at the base, tapering to a width of 18 feet at the crest, which is 304.5 feet above bedrock. The structure contains 610,000 cubic yards of stone and rubble concrete. The "lake" formed by the dam, which stores only the flood waters of the Rio Grande, will be forty-five miles long, with an average depth of sixty-six feet. It will have 250 miles of shore line and a storage capacity of 862,200,000 gallons, or enough to cover 2,642,295 acres of land to the depth of one foot

PRESIDENT OF SANTA FE MAKES STATEMENT TO DIRECTORS

Says Stockholders Must Use Influence for Remedial Legislation Since Arbitration Has Been Abandoned and Congress Has Established Precedent of Hurriedly Paying Demands of Workmen.

CHICAGO, Oct. 2.—President Ripley of the Santa Fe railroad today sent to all stockholders a statement proposing a fight for changes in the provisions of the Adamson eight hour bill.

In the statement President Ripley says: "Since the precedent of abandoning arbitration to settle industrial disputes has been established, and the precedent of hurriedly paying the demands of the railroad brotherhoods by special congressional enactment has been established, it behooves us to exercise our influence for remedial legislation."

MILK SHORTAGE HITS NEW YORK

FIGHT BETWEEN DAIRYMEN AND MILK DEALERS CAUSES BIGGEST CITY TO LIVE ON HALF OF USUAL SUPPLY

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—As a result of a fight between the Dairymen's League and the Milk Dealers' Association, New York is living on half its usual supply of milk.

During the shortage the general hospitals for babies are receiving most consideration by the milk dealers.

Farmers are abandoning milk shipments and are turning their milk into butter.

Last night masked men at Utica seized 25,000 quarts of milk consigned to the Milk Dealers' Association and destroyed it.
