## TO RAISE POLE COLUMBUS DAY

APPROPRIATE EXERCISES WILL BE HELD BY ALL SCHOOLS WHEN FLAG POLE IS RAISED AT WEST SIDE SCHOOL

Columbus Day, October 12th, will be the occasion for raising the new flagpole at the West Side grammar school. Exercises, in which all the schools of the city will participate, will be held and the pole raised with ceremony.

City Attorney Rollo C. Grosbeck will speak on patriotism and Columbus, and W. A. Delsell will speak for the school board.

The new pole was furnished by the Pelican Bay Lumber company, and will stand sixty feet above the ground.

## CANDIDATES WILL SPEAK AT SHASTA VIEW OCTOBER 14

EVERYONE IS INVITED TO ATTEND MEETING

Affair is Arranged to Meet Candidates and Raise Funds for a Piano for the Shasta View School—Baskets Will Be Sold for Set Price, and Free Coffee Given to All Who are at the Pow Wow.

Office seekers of all descriptions will hold forth at Shasta View school house on the evening of October 14th. They have been invited by the voters of that district to come, buy supper, and tell the people what they will do and will not do if elected.

The political pow wow is to be staged to raise funds with which to buy a piano for the Shasta View school. Baskets will not be auctioned off, but will be sold for \$1 and for 50 cents, no more and no less. In addition to the food in the baskets, hot coffee and sandwiches and other good eats will be furnished by the school district free.

After the supper the candidates will be given an opportunity to address the meeting on "the political issues of the day," as Judge Leavitt would express it.

## DEED BLANKS FOR NEW ROAD READY

BONANZA IS PREPARING TO GET RIGHT OF WAY DEEDS FOR BRANCH LINE FROM DAIRY TO BONANZA

Evidence of the fact that the Bonanza Railroad Promotion Club is beginning the work of securing rights of way deeds for the Strahorn road is contained in the order from Robert E. Strahorn to have printed blanks for right of way contracts. Mr. Strahorn is acting in response to a request from the Bonanza club for blanks.

The blanks that are being printed are very similar to those used for right of way from Klamath Falls to Sprague River. The Bonanza club will use them to get signed up the right of way from Bonanza to a point near Delry where the Bonanza branch railroad will meet the main Strahorn road from Klamath Falls to Sprague River.

## TELLS HUSBAND TO TAKE CHILD; THEN CHANGES NOTION

FLEES WITH CHILD FOR ASHLAND IN A JITNEY

Woman Whom Greek Is Charged With Transporting From Weed to Klamath Falls Asks Husband to Relieve Her of Baby; He Comes, and Then Is Refused Offspring.

Fidelity to Abductor Is Declared.

After she had wired her husband to come from Weed and get their child, Mrs. Mary Shaw this morning suddenly changed her mind and hired a jitney for Ashland. She left in the car early this morning without stating her destination, beyond Ashland.

Mrs. Shaw is the woman whom Gust Kutiupes, a Greek, is charged with abducting and transporting to Klamath Falls from Weed. Kutiupes was arrested and taken to Weed yesterday to face white slavery charges. The woman was left here, and soon wired to her husband to come for their 2 year old baby. Mr. Shaw came last night, but when he reached his wife she changed her mind about giving up the baby.

Before leaving for Ashland she declared to Sheriff Low that she will stay with the Greek to get him out of prison, even "if it takes ten years."
