Did Russia and Germany Discuss Separate Peace?

By CARL ACKERMAN (United Press Staff Correspondent) THE HAGUE, Sept. 16.—(By mail)—Despite official denials that Russia and Germany recently discussed a separate peace, I have learned from recent visits to Warsaw, Copenhagen and The Hague that some sort of a conference did take place.

At present, however, there is little prospect that Russia will desert the allies. Rumania's intervention into the war has changed the situation entirely from the czar's standpoint. The report that a peace meeting was held at Kovno was published recently in the Nieuwe Courant, one of the best informed newspapers of Holland. The Courant article has not been published in any belligerent country, it is understood here, though it created a sensation in Holland and the neutral Scandinavian countries.

Immediately following its publication, the Russian legation here issued a denial. A similar denial was telegraphed from Berlin, but regardless of all this fact, officials in Scandinavian countries believe a great deal of the Courant article is true.

The Courant asserted the special representative of the czar and Premier Strumer met the kaiser and Field Marshal von Hindenburg at Kovno in August. Exactly what caused the negotiations to be broken off was not learned. One report was that Russia learned that Rumania was about to enter the war. Another report was that Emperor Franz Josef has refused to cede Galicia and Bukovina to Russia, the price demanded for a separate peace by the czar.

Russia was said to be willing to make a separate peace because she was afraid of Japanese aggression in China, because General Brusiloff's offensive had failed to capture Lemberg and Kovel, and because the allies had not given her successful cooperation on other fronts. Germany, according to a neutral in The Hague, was willing to see that Turkey made some concession to Russia regarding the Dardanelles. Poland was to be made a kingdom, with a slice of Galicia added, under Prince Leopold of Bavaria.

Expulsion of a Student Shows Teacher's Failure

United Press Service SACRAMENTO, Oct. 7.—Expulsion of a pupil from school is the best evidence of weakness and failure on the part of the teacher of that pupil, State Superintendent of Public Instruction Hyatt declared today, in commenting on a letter he received recently from a teacher in which she gave the opinion that "it is better to send a bad youngster away before he demoralizes the whole class."

"A school is a place to take children into, not to send them out from," continued Hyatt. "Therefore, every expulsion is by that much a failure. I observed that the wise and successful teachers find a way somehow to avoid it. He manages somehow to keep the bad boy in school, complying with the general rules for the most part, and going along, getting something out of his associations with orderly, law-abiding pupils.

"Of course, it may be that things will get into such a pass that it becomes an open rupture, a show-down between teacher and pupil, and the

teacher has to save his face by force or by sending the pupil away. The experienced teacher, wise in human nature, however, in some way forestalls the storm and forestalls it."
