

GERMANS GAIN IN OPERATIONS IN SOUTHWEST

FIGHTING IN LAST 24 HOURS SUCCESSFUL

Tenton Force at Vulcan Pass Taken Gateway to Upper and Lower Calk Regions—Berlin Claims That Emperor Franz Josef's Soldiers Have Repulsed All Assaults by Both the Russian and Italian Armies.

United Press Service BERLIN, Oct. 10.—The German operations against the Rumanians of the last twenty-four hours have been successful.

The division fighting around Vulcan Pass captured Negrolux mountain, in Transylvania, and took the gateway to the upper and lower Calk regions.

Kronstadt also has been recaptured. The Austrians have repulsed all Russian and Italian attacks.

United Press Service LONDON, Oct. 10.—The British force opposing the Bulgarians captured Kalendra and Homodos. The allies are advancing in Macedonia.

COUNCIL PASSES NEW ORDINANCE

MAKES IT POSSIBLE FOR PEOPLE OF CITY TO EXERCISE INITIATIVE AND REFERENDUM AT ANY TIME

The city council last night adopted unanimously the ordinance adopting for the city the initiative and referendum, as provided by the state constitution. It was necessary to do this before the initiative could be used by local citizens to get the council to call a special election to vote on a bond issue for the Strahorn railroad.

Immediately after Mayor Crisler had signed the ordinance, the council took up consideration of another ordinance calling the election to vote the bonds.

The people of this city now may exercise the initiative or referendum at any time and for any purpose.

Election on Keno Power Franchise November 14

The people of Klamath Falls will vote on November 14th on the question of granting to the Keno Power company a franchise to distribute electricity within the city limits. This was decided last night by the city council after the ordinance stating the terms of the franchise had been introduced and passed to its third reading. The people on November 14th will merely express to the city council its wishes on the question of the franchise. Then the council will carry out these wishes by granting or refusing a franchise. Only the council can actually grant a franchise. The ordinance, read for the first time last night, cannot be passed finally until sixty days have elapsed. At the end of this period the council will pass the ordinance, thereby granting the franchise, if the people have so voted. Otherwise the ordinance never will come up for a third reading.

STRIKING MINERS BLOCK ROADWAY

SHERIFF AND PARTY FAIL TO FORCE OPENING OF ROAD. MILITIA MAY BE CALLED TO DISPERSE MINERS

United Press Service SUTTER CREEK, Calif., Oct. 10.—Two hundred and fifty striking miners this morning blocked the roads leading from here south to the Eureka mines, and prevented its reopening. Efforts of the sheriff's party to force a way were unsuccessful. The local authorities are requesting calling for a militia detachment. Up to late this afternoon there have been no clashes. It is believed the miners are armed.

CHANDLER BEST RIDER AT YREKA

Klamath county cowboys took a good share of the prizes at the Yreka rodeo, according to William Sims, who returned from Yreka today. Love Chandler of Malin captured first prize in the bucking contest, and Sims took first place all three days in the potato race. He won this race over Buffalo Vernon, one of the best in the world in this event. Chandler performed the unique feat of bulldozing a steer from an automobile. George Fletcher, the Pendleton negro, came second to Chandler in the bucking contest. The bulldozing event was won by Buffalo Vernon, champion bulldozer of the world. Chandler stayed on Nero, the bucking bull, for twenty seconds, one of the longest rides ever made on this bull. Fletcher could stay but five seconds.
