TALK PROBLEMS CAUSED BY WAR

FARMERS' NATIONAL CONGRESS
TODAY IS DISCUSSING KEEPING
OF WHEAT IN UNITED STATES
TO AVOID SHORTAGE

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 18.—That the European war has imposed new problems upon the farming population is a fact that is to be taken up and fully discussed at the Farmers' National congress meeting here today for a four days' session.

Already there has been agitation to the effect that the export of wheat to European countries should be prohibited to avert the possibility of a food shortage in the United States.

The problems of soil fertility and intensive agriculture will be given attention and recommended as one method of overcoming the unbalanced situation created by the conflict abroad.

The convention will muster such names as those of Gifford Pinchot, Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, United States Senator Hoke Smith of Georgia, and Congressman Ralph W. Moss of Indiana will address the congress.

WILL NOT INTERFERE

Says No Peace if War Must Go to Knock Out

COLOGNE, Oct. 14.—"If these fellows make peace only when Germany is 'knocked out' then we will never have peace."

This emphatic declaration came today from Ernest Posse, chief editor of the Cologne Gazette, and probably Germany's greatest editor. His thirty-two years connection with that powerful journal makes him perhaps the best unofficial spokesman of the empire, in replying to Lloyd George's recent statement to the United Press, that the war must go on to a finish.

"For weeks, the allies have conducted a press campaign against peace, especially at Washington," said Posse. "They have said repeatedly that there will be no peace until we are broken, until they reach the Rhine."

"These statements have strengthened our position enormously. In my opinion the military situation is better today than it was a year ago. The allies will never be able to break the west front, while the situation on other fronts may improve. The people are filled with confidence in von Hindenburg."

"Can President Wilson make peace?" he was asked. "This war is so enormous that the methods for bringing peace which applied formerly do not apply today," he replied. "An international congress cannot settle it. The only plan is for Wilson, through ambassadors, to suggest that special envoys meet in Washington, but I do not believe this would succeed now."

"The allies want peace on their own terms, which we certainly will not consider. Hehe, as elsewhere, there are peace-at-any-price folk, but the German people, as a whole, want peace only when we can exist as a nation."

Three things the Gazette editor considers for peace, so far as Germany is concerned.

First, the military situation must be considered, he said. Germany must follow Bismarck's policy of protecting her western boundary, perhaps by taking the French fortress of Belfort and, as the chancellor indicated, she must have an independent Poland on her other frontier to protect her against Russian aggression.

Second, Germany must develop and protect her agricultural resources so that she will no longer be dependent on Argentine or Russia for wheat or cattle. She must protect her industries so she can exist in the event of another war without outside aid, if necessary.

Third, Germany must consider her

international position, and must have colonies.

Posse believes that Chancellor von Bethmann Hollweg will retain his post for the remainder of the war, despite the attacks of his critics. Field Marshal von Hindenburg, he feels, is the key to the whole situation, and so long as von Hindenburg and the kaiser join with Hollweg in opposing unlimited submarine warfare, it will not be renewed.

NO CHANCE NOW TO
GIVE POLAND RELIEF

NATIVE SONS TO PLAY SATURDAY

TEAM ALMOST WHOLLY OREGON
BRED WILL REPRESENT THIS
STATE AGAINST CALIFORNIANS
OCTOBER 21ST

(Herald Special Service)

EUGENE, Oct. 18.—A football team that is almost entirely Oregon-bred and Oregon-raised leaves today to meet the California-bred and California-raised men of the University of Oregon. The game will be played in the Berkeley stadium on the afternoon of October 21st, and will be the first test of football strength in many years between Oregon and California. The one university outnumbers the other in attendance about ten to one, yet such is the training, the determination and the quality of the fine Oregon squad that the giant of the south is believed to have small advantage.

"After all, only eleven men can meet eleven of our men at once," said Hugo Bezdek.

Coach Bezdek will take eighteen men. They will average, stripped, 180 pounds. They will represent fifteen towns, of which eleven are Oregon towns. They will be

The game will be the first of the year in the new Pacific Coast Intercollegiate conference formed at Portland last December, with membership of University of California, University of Oregon, University of Washington and Oregon State Agricultural College. Stanford University has been invited to join, but has not yet abandoned rugby.

Mons Military Policy

According to the general opinion expressed in Washington the selection of Count Selki Terauchi as premier of Japan announced October 4th marks the embarkation of Japan on an aggressive military policy, as it is understood that Count Terauchi favors such a policy, more especially with respect to China. Influential Japanese newspapers have rebuked the Japanese embassy at Washington for disavowing responsibility for the speech of Baron Sakatani in New York, in which he said that Japan would renege after the war her contention for the right of Japanese to own land in the United States. The Asahi, a leading paper, said: "Baron Sakatani voices the views of the Japanese nation."

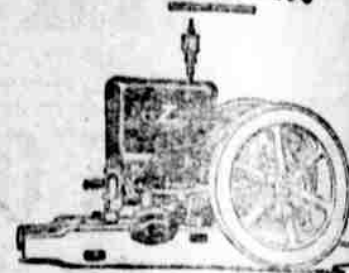
