

Germans Cut Rumanians From Source of Supplies

VON MACKENEN ADVANCES ALONG 45-MILE FRONT

Russian Left Flank in Carpathians Fighting is Turned, Says Vienna. Rumanian Right Wing is Crushed by Bulgarians, Who Advance to Within Six Miles of Important Port on Black Sea.

United Press Service BERLIN, Oct. 23.—General Von Mackenau this afternoon captured Constanta. Military officers high in the German general staff declare this victory is of more importance than all the gains of the Allies in the Somme fighting.

It is indicated in reports received today that the Slavs have been routed disastrously in the last two days in a 12-mile advance from Tuzla.

Heretofore the Russians have been sending troops and supplies to Rumania through Constanta. Its capture by the Germans cuts off all chance to send reinforcements via the Black Sea.

The Teutons are now advancing to capture the remainder of the Constanta-Cernavoda railroad and Cernavoda itself.

United Press Service LONDON, Oct. 23.—The combined German, Bulgarian and Turkish forces today launched a great offensive on a 46-mile front at Dobrudja in an effort to capture the Constanta-Cernavoda railroad, which connects the Rumanian and Russian armies and supplies the former.

Thus far today the Russo-Rumanian forces are withstanding the assaults launched against them.

Vienna reports that the Russian left flank in the Carpathians has been turned.

United Press Service SOFIA, Oct. 23.—The Bulgarian right wing has crushed the Rumanian right wing and today is within six miles of Constanta, a Black Sea port.

The official statement says: The enemy's resistance at the principal positions has been completely broken but at Kobadin and Tuzla the resistance is strong. The enemy is

loving heavily and retreating. The Bulgarian right wing has occupied 'okingholl'.

United Press Service BRISBANE, Oct. 23.—The Rumanian force at Dobrudja today continues its retreat, though resisting stubbornly.

Repeatedly Rumanian attacks in the Tretusa, Oatusa and Clanta valleys and in Transylvania and western Moldavia have forced slight Teutonic retirement.

The Carpaia Volryna fighting is lacking in German efforts to advance north of the city have been repulsed.

United Press Service PARIS, Oct. 23.—The French have captured Hill No. 129, northwest of the city.

The Germans continue their bombardment south of the Somme but today are making no attacks by infantry.

German aviators last night unsuccessfully raided Lunenburg. French aeroplanes today are bombarding railroad and industrial centers held by the Germans.

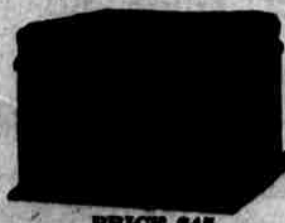
