

SUFFRAGE STATES HAVE 91 BALLOTS

BOTH BIG PARTIES ARE MAKING STRONG BIDS FOR VOTES IN THESE TWELVE STATES HAVING SUFFRAGE.

United Press Service. CHICAGO, Oct. 27.—How will finally mark her ballot Nov. 7? Both major political parties are trying desperately to shape the answer. For as the women go, so may the nation. They may swing Illinois with its 29 votes and the 12 suffrage states have a total of 91 electoral votes.

That is why the woman voter will not trip unnoticed to the polls this year. Hundreds of party workers and thousands of dollars are being poured out in a feverish bid for her vote.

At western campaign headquarters of both parties here the women's bureau—Mrs. George Allen at the Democratic and Miss Barriett A. Vittum at the Republican—are making the big final drive to capture the women's votes. Theodore Roosevelt will speak at a women's rally here tomorrow and is expected by Republicans to offset the effect of President Wilson's speech to women here last week.

The women's bureau are independent campaign organizations maintaining bureaus for foreign women, trades union women, speakers' bureaus, committees on literature, publicity, women's clubs, organization, and finance. The women have duplicated the national campaign organization of the men and are running it alone.

These women's bureaus are not pink tea affairs. In a busy office where there are dozens of women moving quickly about, jangling telephones, clicking typewriters, and rows of girls deftly slipping campaign literature into envelopes and stamping them. At desks women are in earnest conference. They are youthful rather than old, but women of dignified, refined manner, many of whom are social workers, or well educated club women. There is no chatter. Men never showed more executive skill—not men politicians at least.

The final windup of the first woman's national campaign is planned to the smallest detail. Hundreds of local organizers are lining up the rural vote. Auto parties of speakers are making week-end trips. It is estimated that 70 per cent of the 1,500,000 women voters in Illinois will cast ballots.

Miss Dorfner of the Philadelphia Turngemeinde, proved the fastest sprinter in the country, and not only won the 50 and 100 yard titles, but shattered the records to pieces in taking them.

Miss Galligan, of the National Women's Lifesaving League, New York, was the heaviest scorer. Championship honors fell to her for 220, 440, 500 yards, one mile and four miles, and she now holds every national standard mark for women from 300 yards to four miles.

Have always insisted on this blended brew.

But now I must shatter traditions, I see,

For Mocha and Java I've picked from one tree.

SAO PAULO, Brazil, Oct. 1.—(By Mail)—This certainly is going to be an awful blow to the domestic coffee connoisseurs. The epicures who smack their lips and extol the elusive flavor of the Java as it subtly intermingles with the Mocha.

Indeed it furnished me coffee ground for surprise when I found the Mocha and the Java not only growing on the same family tree but even on the same branch of the family.

The best way to settle the coffee question is to take a night's train trip from Rio to Sao Paulo. The state of Sao Paulo is the greatest coffee growing country in the world. Its capital, City of Sao Paulo, is justly dubbed the "Chicago of South America." A two hours run by train brings us to the little town of Campinas right out in the midst of the open rolling coffee country.

The "king" of Campinas himself took us by auto out through the coffee plantations. He is a king by his own dubbing. This successful North American from Lawrence, Kansas, chose to make light of my appellation just as he chose to make light of Campinas. You see he controls the electric light plant and the traction line in Campinas as well as in thirteen other small Brazilian towns. Surely a neat little crown incandescent bulbs is not amiss above his brow.

I've heard of people palting the town red, but they would be helpless to incardinate further the country of Sao Paulo. All the soil is of a marvelous redness shading to vivid crimson and rose. With its billowing red hills it is startlingly reminiscent of San Diego county, California. Showing a Hibernian tendency the coffee trees all have the green of the coffee trees above the red soil. As far as the eye can see the coffee plantations stretch away into the distance. Some plantations boast of over a million trees.

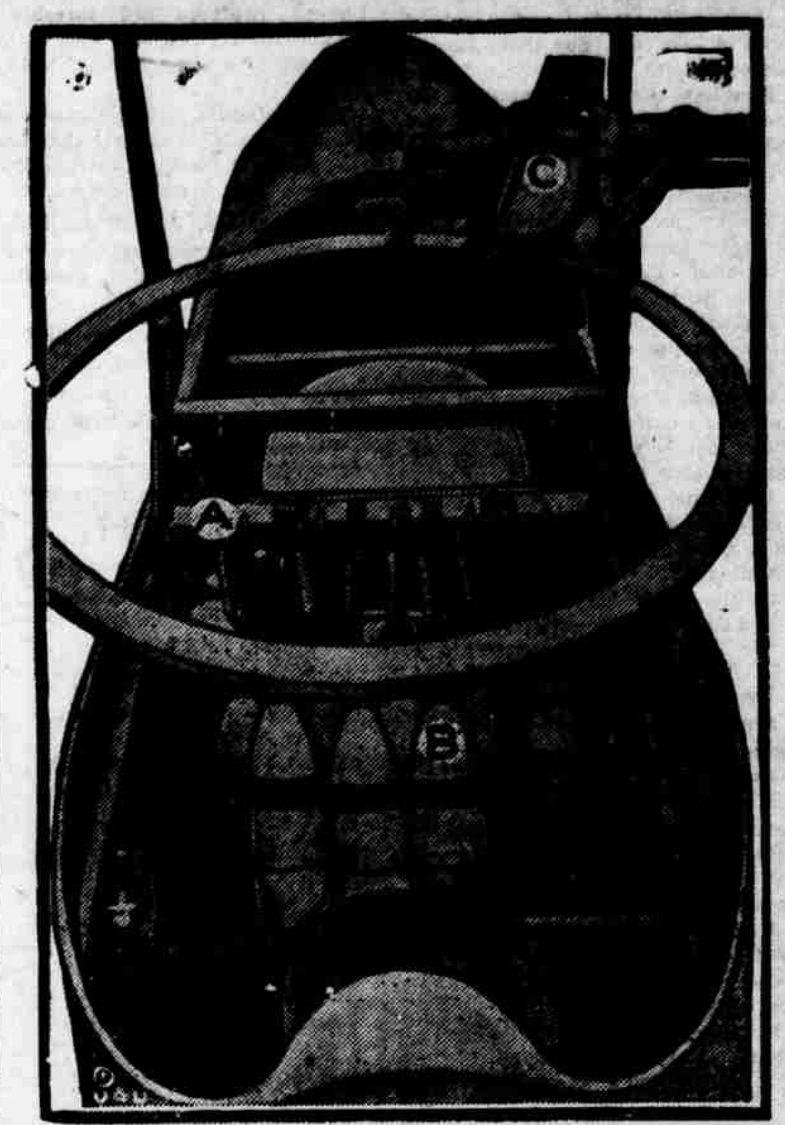
CHICAGO, Oct. 28.—The fuzzy brown "cattail" that grows in the marshes, now looms on the horizon as a possible competitor of cotton, said Prof. John Coulter, botanist of the University of Chicago today.

Prof. Coulter uses the scholarly name "typha," for the said "tall."

"The Germans have found a way to make excellent cloth from the typha," said Prof. Coulter, "and I see no reason why we cannot do the same. The typha could be raised in commercial quantities far more cheaply than cotton and with improved manufacturing facilities it could be made into cloth at a price which I would cut to high cost of living."

Find Coal in Argentine

BUENOS AIRES, Oct. 28.—The discovery is reported of extensive coal deposits in the Argentine province of San Juan. The statement is made that it is nearly as good as the best quality of Welsh coal. Experts have not yet had a chance, however, to make a test as to quality or to determine the extent of the fields. Coal would prove of immense importance to Argentina, which is prevented from becoming a great industrial country by lack of cheap fuel.

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
