STATES PARTIES WILL BE LABELS

CANADIAN SUFFRAGIST SPEAKS ON "DEBAUCH OF POLITICAL FOOLISHNESS THE POLITICIANS ARE INDULGING IN."

By GEORGE MARTIN (United Press Staff Correspondent) NEW YORK, Oct. 31.—"The Republican, Democratic and other political parties won't be anything but labels when the women get the vote throughout this country."

"I am starting a six week's tour of the United States for the National American Woman Suffrage Association," she said, "and the little distance I have gone I am amazed at the hide bound partisanship shown on all sides of the political campaign for president."

"It's all foolishness, this bandying of unpleasant words between the candidates. It is petty and trifling and when all the women have the vote you will see it done away with."

"The ready-made opinion factories now in full swing for one candidate or other other will be laughed at then."

"In our four Canadian provinces now having suffrage, the women show little inclination to link themselves with either party. Nor do they all agree among themselves. Each does her own thinking. They are willing to listen to all claims from all sides, but they wear no labels on their backs to bind them to any principles or positions they don't believe in."

"The tremendous increase in the independent vote of this country will put the political parties on a strictly goods delivering basis."

Mrs. McClung, during the next six weeks, will speak in Milwaukee, Racine, Elkhart, Muncie, Louisville, Nashville, New Orleans, Galveston, Houston, San Antonio, Waco, Dallas and Kansas City.

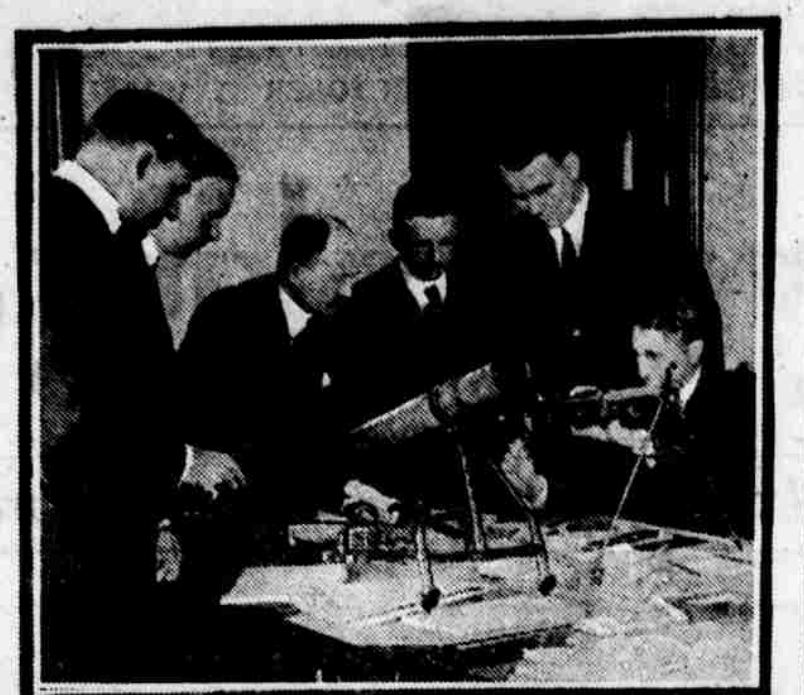
Submarines on Pacific Coast

United Press Service LOS ANGELES, Oct. 31.—A "new line of defense" along the Pacific coast is being discussed here today, following announcement that the newest types of submarines and aircraft are to be stationed at Los Angeles harbor and at San Diego. Both the "L" and "O" groups of submarines nearing completion at Long Beach and Seattle will be stationed in southern California waters, while it is reported that 33 military and naval planes of the latest types will be delivered at San Diego before the first of the year. These are designed for fighting, "spotting" or scouting, and for "bombing." They are all steel, armed with machine guns, and driven by high power engines.

Must Know Portuguese to "Get By" in Brazil

ROBERTSON (United Press Staff Correspondent) RIO DE JANEIRO, Oct. 15.—(By Mail)—That young America is casting a speculative eye on Brazil is evident from the hundreds of letters received by Americans already established here. "What are the chances for a young man, with large ambition but small bank account, in Brazil?" he writes. The answer is, "The chances in Brazil are very good if (and it is an important 'if')—if you speak the language." The language of Brazil is Portuguese. Incidentally it is a serious mistake to suppose that one can "get by" by speaking Spanish. Spanish is no better understood than English in Brazil. The United States puts on considerable chest over its size and natural resources, but in neither one has it "anything on" Brazil. It is the fourth largest country in the world, its natural resources are unlimited, and it has a population of about twenty-five millions which has not yet driven its frontier more than a third of the way to the western boundary. Agriculture is by far the most important occupation, with commerce, construction, transportation, mining, lumbering and manufacturing following in order of importance. All are in about the same stage of development as they were in the United States in Van Buren's administration. In only a few of the industries are the methods modern. American up-to-date methods and ingenuity are eagerly welcomed, however, as Brazilians are progressive, after a late start. The climate ranges from torrid heat of the tropical Amazon to occasional frost in the southernmost states. Agriculture takes its harvest from two to five times a year. Coffee, rubber, sugar, tobacco, cotton, grains, fruits and livestock products are the chief sources of agricultural riches. In the export of the agricultural products and the import of practically all the Brazilian uses in manufactured goods commerce prospers—in the hands of foreigners who carry on practically all the commercial activities of the country. A new country whose chief thought is its own development gives the engineer, the contractor and the builder the opportunity he seeks, and there is no limit to the range of his work. Railroads are penetrating the jungled valleys following the westward moving farmer. Electric power is sought in the thousands of rivers that tumble from the mountain ranges. Villages and towns are being built in farming centers, at the mouth of mines and where trails cross. Gold, precious stones, coal, iron, copper and rarer metals make it worth while to mine in practically every state in Brazil. Manufacturing is still very much an infant industry. Seventy-five million people will be added to the present population before Brazil accomplishes the development that was worked in the United States from Van Buren to Wilson, and just as many fortunes will be made here as were made there in the interval. These fortunes will be made in about the same way and by the same kind of men—pioneers.

D. 1916, at the following named polling places, in the City of Klamath Falls, Klamath County, Oregon, to-wit: First Ward—Polling place, Bank Exchange. Second Ward—Polling place, New City Hall. Third Ward—Polling place, Sanderson building. Fourth Ward—Polling place, McDonald's store. Fifth Ward—Polling place, Reed building, Fairview Addition. A special election will be held, at which there will be submitted to the qualified voters of said city for their approval or rejection, pursuant to Ordinance No. 396, passed and approved on the 16th day of October, A. D. 1916, an amendment to Section 87, Article IV., of the charter of the City of Klamath Falls, proposed, adopted and submitted by the common council to the qualified voters of the city. Said proposed amendment is printed in pamphlet form by the city and copies mailed to every legal voter within the city whose address is known, and said pamphlet can be had at the office of the police judge upon application. The general purport of said charter amendment is expressed in the ballot title adopted by the police judge and the common council, and which will appear upon the ballot, being numbered 300 to 301 and in the following words: "Shall Section 87, Article IV., of the charter of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, be amended to authorize and empower the common council to buy, build, equip, acquire, maintain and operate railways and railroads operated by steam, electric or other power, and to acquire rights-of-way, terminals, easements and real property, and to bring actions for the condemnation of public use, and to borrow money and fund indebtedness to carry out any one or more of said powers by issuing and selling the negotiable warrants or bonds of said city to the aggregate amount of

three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000.00), bearing interest at not more than six per centum (6 per centum) per annum, and payable semi-annually, said warrants or bonds to be payable in not to exceed fifty (50) years, and providing for the levy and collection of a direct annual ad valorem tax on all the taxable property in said city, in addition to all other taxes, sufficient to pay the principal and interest on said warrants or bonds according to their tenor; and repealing any provision or provisions of the charter of said city in conflict therewith; all of which is more particularly set forth in Ordinance No. 396, passed and approved on the 24th day of October, A. D. 1916, submitting said amendment to the voters of the City of Klamath Falls."

The said special election will be held commencing at nine o'clock in the morning and the polls will remain open until eight o'clock in the afternoon of said day.
