Thompson Scores Wilson's Policies

taken literally, the power of this nation to protect its citizens in peace was destroyed. Since that time our mails have been held up and opened, our commerce destroyed, our citizens killed with impunity. The nations of the world know that the most they will receive from us is a note—backed by nothing. It does not follow that those who oppose the administration want war. No one in this country wants war. But we do want honor. We want our nation to stand for something. We want our lives and property respected. We want our nation conducted with a knowledge of power behind every assertion its chief executive makes. Submission to aggression, surrender of just rights, breeds contempt, and in due time will destroy the peace of any nation.

"In 1887 another great democrat, Grover Cleveland, secured prompt recognition of this country's rights from Mexico. A lieutenant from the Mexican army pursued a Mexican girl across the border, captured her on soil of the United States, and dragged her back into Mexico. She was a Mexican girl, but she was on American territory. Immediately Cleveland ordered the army to the border with instructions to go to Mexico City, if necessary, to bring back the man who had violated the integrity of American territory. The Mexican lieutenant was delivered up immediately and imprisoned. That was action that could be understood by Mexicans. Today Mexicans murder our people on our own soil with impunity.

"You all are familiar with President Roosevelt's prompt action in the famous Pedernales incident, all of which shows that demands that you make, that are just, that are backed with power of enforcement, are acceded to without war. Unenforceable, insincere demands breed contempt that will lead to aggression and war.

"But the present administration has not kept us out of war. When our democratic friends discuss war they carefully point to Europe, never to Mexico, because there we have gotten into war—a war that is inexcusable, useless, ignoble. Was it war when our marines attacked Vera Cruz, with a loss of 19 men killed, and the death of over 100 Mexicans? Ask the mothers and sisters of the dead. Was it war when our army under orders in Mexico was ambushed and attacked at Carrizal? Ask the parents of Lt. Adair, an Oregon boy who was killed in that ambush. Yes, it was war in the strictest sense—inexcusable war, fraught with the direst consequences for this country and for Mexico. At a time when comparative order was maintained in Mexico, when the administration had declared that Mexico must be permitted to solve her own governmental problems, the American navy was ordered to attack Vera Cruz upon the pretext that Mexico had refused to salute our flag in reparation for the mistaken arrest of some American marines—a mistake that was promptly corrected and explained with apology. The flag was not saluted and since that time it has been dragged in the dirt, spat upon, insulted, in Mexico with impunity. American men have been killed, women ravished, millions of dollars of property destroyed without fear of punishment or thought of reparation. The real reason for waging war at Vera Cruz was not a real or fancied insult. That war was started for the deliberate purpose of meddling in Mexican affairs and destroying the only government Mexico had, if we may believe the statements of John Lind, the president's personal representative in Mexico. Instead of keeping hands off Mexico, the president decided that Huerta must go, Huerta, whose government had been recognized by most of the first class powers of the world. It was not material whether we recognized Huerta, but it was important that we refrain from assisting the murderous bandits who were assailing the Huerta government. The president in his

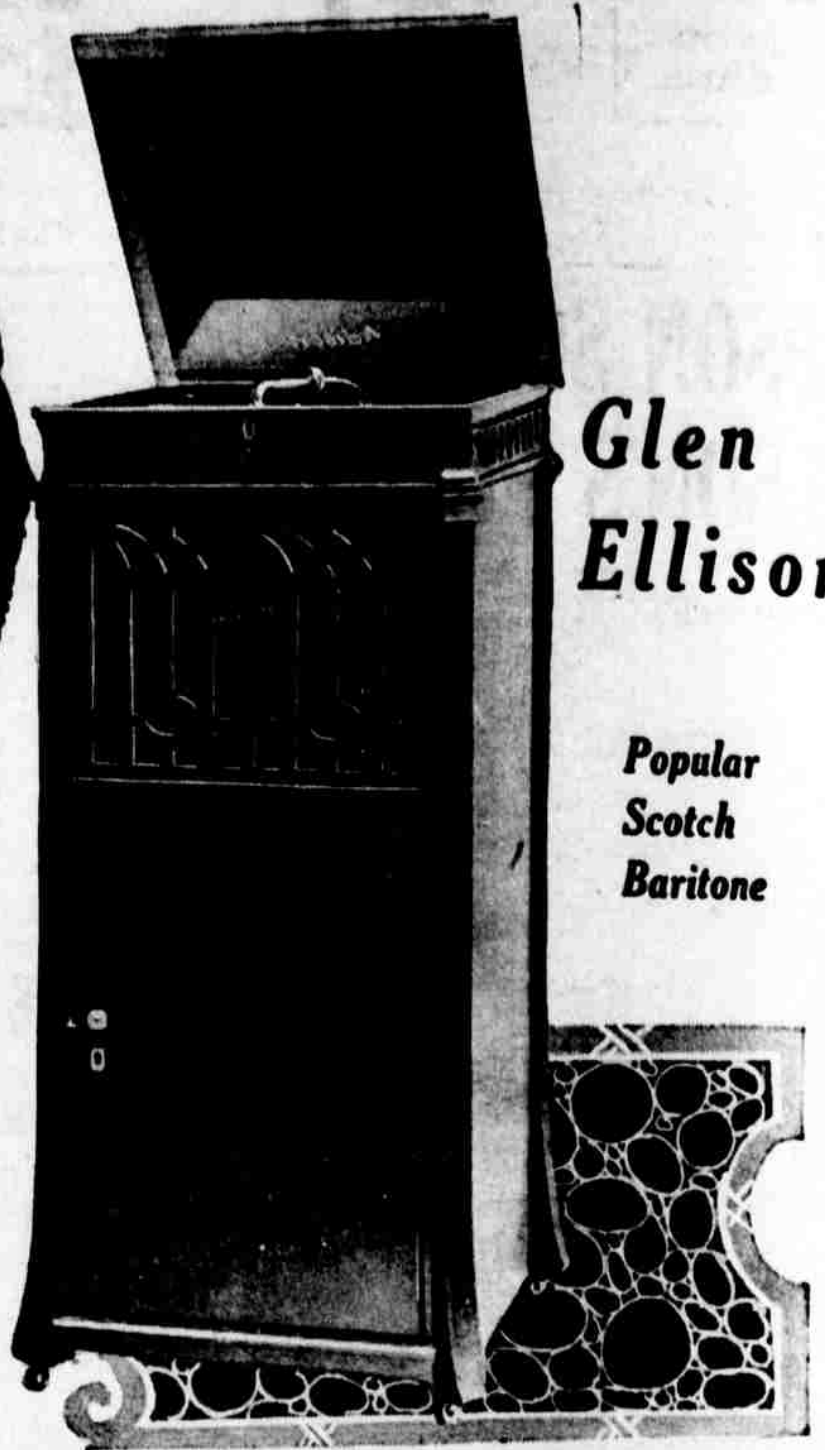
speech of acceptance said he would not recognize Huerta because he was a murderer of Mexicans, and yet he recognized Carranza when his hands were dripping with the blood of murdered Americans and Mexicans. The fruits of that action have been chaos, rapine, murder. It is no defense of the administration to now ask: "Do you want war with Mexico?" The place to begin that investigation is with the cause of the conditions that now exist. We do not want war, neither do we want officious interference that renders war necessary.

"The destruction of property and life has not been confined to the lives or property of Americans in Mexico. Citizens of the great nations now at war in Europe have been the victims of Mexican lawlessness. The New York Times, a Wilson paper, recently stated the property loss in Mexico to be \$1,000,000,000, of which \$600,000,000 belonged to citizens of the United States and \$400,000,000 to citizens of Great Britain, Germany and France. When the European war is ended and England and Germany demand reparation from Mexico for past injuries, and due protection of their citizens and their property in Mexico in future, what is going to happen? Are we going to maintain the Monroe doctrine and insist that foreign nations keep hands off of the American continent? Can we have any fair assurance of inducing Mexico to give the protection European nations will demand and require, when our conduct has caused the Mexicans to hold us and our demands in utmost contempt?

"There is another condition which we must be prepared to meet at the close of the European war, the importance of which was accentuated by the first fruits of democratic policies before the great war began. I refer to the economic distress that followed the enactment of the Underwood free trade tariff bill. We have tried experiments of this kind in the past, and always with disastrous results, but never were the evil effects manifested more quickly than in the present instance. In the nine months of the Underwood bill ending August 1, 1914, a deficiency of \$30,000,000 was created in the national treasury, and an emergency tax was levied upon the people of this country to provide revenue to run the government. Importations increased during this time, to the detriment of the American farmer, stockman, manufacturer and laborer, and revenue decreased. The president in his message of September 14, 1914, urged the necessity of an emergency tax to raise \$100,000,000 because the European war would reduce importations. The average rate of tax provided by the Underwood law is about 11 per cent. To raise this amount from custom duty under the present law will require the additional importation of one billion dollars' worth of foreign products. Products manufactured with cheap foreign labor to ruin the industries of this country. Products that will deprive the American laborer of approximately \$700,000,000 in wages, that will deprive the American rancher of the profit of feeding these workmen, that will dot our country with free soup houses and line our streets with idle men. This is not an idle theory, my friends.

"I do not care to take up in detail the promises or acts of the present administration. Their violation of their platform pledge regarding the Panama canal tolls was a serious blow to the Pacific coast states, and served to hold up railroad freight rates on our commodities. But I believe the greatest example of incompetence is the Adamson bill, jammed through congress in three days without deliberation or investigation. It is in no sense a law limiting hours of labor of railroad employees. It provides an increase in wages of the highest paid men—the aristocrats—of the railroad service. I don't know whether they deserved more pay, but congress and the president didn't know either. With the rights and interests of 100,000,000 people involved, the bill was passed at the demand of 400,000 men, whose managers held a stop watch on congress. You and I pay the bill. There were necessarily three parties to that controversy: First, there were the railroad presidents; Second, the men who demanded an arbitrary increase in wages; Third, the 100,000,000 people who ship over the railroads. Without investigating the righteousness of the demands, the rights of the people were thrown into the scrapheap. You and I will pay the increase in wages. It will appear in increased freight rates, decreasing our profits on what we sell and increasing the price of what we buy. When any man or set of men can secure legislation to a stop watch without consideration of the justness of their demands or the rights of the people, there is something wrong with the administration.

"The grand old republican party presents as its standard-bearer this year that great exponent of Americanism, Charles Evans Hughes. A man with an unblemished record of

achievement. A man who as governor of New York demonstrated his clear judgment and independent honesty. A real statesman, who promised peace with honor and respect, price with protection of American lives and property in foreign lands; passing through a storm of American industry, as a result of a re-creation, with class legislation eliminated. His clear view of the international situation was shown during his recent tour through Virginia. A man in the audience, not satisfied with Mr. Hughes' statement of his position demanded to know what the republican candidate would

have done when the Lusitania was sunk. As is usual with our democratic friends in this campaign, the questioner assumed the sinking to be unavoidable. But Mr. Hughes, the statesman, answered that first he would have placed at the head of the state department a man who measured up to the office and who would not destroy this nation's standing before the world; Second, he would have done no officious meddling in Mexican affairs, and would have compelled Mexican respect for the lives and property of foreigners instead of winning international contempt by our inability to protect ourselves

against a weak nation like Mexico. Third, when notice was published in America that ships carrying non-battants and citizens of America would be sunk, he would have served notice upon Germany in no uncertain terms that such action would immediately cause unfriendly relations. And with such action from a powerful nation having the respect of the world, the Lusitania would have been saved. He further announced that he would not permit American mails to be held up and opened or American commerce destroyed by England. Why, the little country of Sweden has enforced her rights in

this regard, and she didn't go to war to do it. So has Holland, with war all around her.

"Don't be misled by the theory that you can be true to your political principles and vote against them for temporary reasons or protests. There is but one way to establish and maintain sound governmental principles, and that is to support them consistently at the ballot.

"Ladies and gentlemen, with the important issues involving our honor and material prosperity that are involved in this campaign, the republican party certainly must win with the men and principles it offers you."
