TEN AMERICANS MAY BE DEAD AT PARRAL, MEXICO

VILLA IS REPORTED TO HAVE CAPTURED THIS PLACE

Refugees Arriving at El Paso Declare Villistas Said They Were Going to Parral to Kill the "Gringos." Carranza Officials Are Sending Families From Chihuahua City Before Evacuation.

EL PASO, Nov. 7.—Officials of the department of state are making every effort to learn the fate of the ten Americans known to be at Parral when the city was reported to have been captured yesterday by Villistas. Refugees arriving here from Chihuahua City say Villistas killed Dr. Fisher, an aged American, at Santa Rosalia.

The refugees declare also that Villistas said they were going to Parral to kill the "gringos" there. It is hoped by government officials that the Americans escaped to the hills. It is reported also that another American besides Dr. Fisher has been killed at Santa Rosalia.

Carranzistas are sending the families here from Chihuahua City. It is believed this city will be evacuated if Villa attacks it.

GERMANS BURN THREE TOWNS; THEN RETREAT

RUMANIANS FORCE RETIREMENT FROM DOBRUDJA FIGHTING

Petrograd Says Fighting West of Silaventin Is Furious, But Undecided—Allies Make Determined Offensive in West, But Are Turned Back With Heavy Losses, Says Berlin Dispatch.

PETROGRAD, Nov. 7.—Three towns on the Dobrudja front were burned yesterday by the Germans before they were forced to retire by the Rumanians.

A furious German offensive west of Silaventin continues, but with only local successes for each side. The Austrians claim local victories on the Italian front.

BERLIN, Nov. 7.—The allies, using all their infantry and artillery in that sector, this morning attacked between Lesars and Buchavnes. The Germans withstood the assault, repulsing it with heavy losses to the allies. The only allied gain was in a small part of the St. Pierre-Vaast woods.

LONDON, Nov. 7.—The Germans have forced British evacuation of the new positions at Butt-de-Walten-court. British raids on Armetieres and in the Ypres sectors have been successful.

Princeton and Yale Are Showing Improvement

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—The Harvard and Princeton are not the only colleges in the East which have football teams, even if the majority of experts the country over do apparently have that opinion. Cornell, Brown, Colgate, and several other colleges are forever butting into the triumvirate and musing things up.

But Yale, Harvard and Princeton consistently have good, strong football teams and they constitute the par excellence of the sport around these parts. The annual clashes of the teams are red letter days on the sports calendar and from the time the final games ring the curtain down football fans are on the trail of these three legends.

Harvard has held the upper hand for several years, largely through the expert advice of one Percy Haughton, who has put more life and pep into the Crimson eleven than it ever believed it could possess.

But this year seems to be the start

of an ascendant of the stars at Princeton and Yale. Yale is getting off to a mighty good start under the tutelage of Tad Jones, and Princeton, in spite of Speedy Rush's loud walls of anguish, is giving a good account of itself.

Yale has a fine backfield in Legore, Bingham and Jacques, and a fine field general to help this trio along in Traver Smith.

Princeton has a good backfield trio, with a fair quarterback in Jack Eddy to help them along. A remarkably good second string quarter is found in Ames. Tibbott is as good a kicker as the East has turned up so far this year.

Harvard, on the other hand, does not seem so strong as in recent previous years when she was wont to walk roughshod over Yale's cohorts. There are no Mahans nor Brickleys. But Haughton has a penchant for rising to emergencies and by the time his big games are due he probably will have a much stronger team in the field than he is now credited with.

NO CONVOY FOR GERMAN DIVER

GERMAN EMBASSY SAYS TO SEND FIGHTING SUBMARINE WOULD REMOVE THE PEACEFUL MERCHANTMAN STATUS.

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—Yale, Harman embassy here declared today that it has no knowledge of the reported plan for a fighting submarine convoy to accompany the Deutschland back to Germany.

The embassy said to do this would remove the Deutschland's peaceful merchantmen status.

The British embassy expressed the fear that the Deutschland will furnish fuel and information to German U boats outside the American three-mile limit.

AMERICAN STEAMER IS SUBMARINED, SAYS LLOYDS

LONDON, Nov. 7.—Lloyds reports that the American steamer Llanos was submarined October 28. Thirty members of the crew have been landed at Wales by a Norwegian steamer. The Llanos was 190 feet long and registered from Manila.
