

Middle West Greatest Battlefield of Ballots

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—The mid-West has been the greatest forecast forum the campaign closed yesterday, and the verdict of the Middle West will be most anxiously awaited tomorrow by campaign managers of both big parties.

Western headquarters of both democrats and republicans were claiming everything in sight today, but a careful checking together of claims from both sides showed the main battle-grounds to be in Illinois, Indiana, Ohio and Wisconsin—a neat little bunch of states representing eighty-four electoral votes.

Each of these four states has received as much attention from both parties as any other in the country. Candidate Hughes made the most vigorous stump tour a presidential candidate has ever undertaken in Ohio and Indiana. And he did not neglect a criss-cross tour of Michigan and Wisconsin. President Wilson got out into Indianapolis and Chicago. The prize orators of both parties have spilled millions of words of argument throughout the confines of this big four—and incidentally have lapped over into Michigan, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri and North Dakota. Hughes did not disdain to stump all of these, and it is because of the impression which he made there that republican managers today are claiming victory in each of these states.

In Illinois women are voting for the first time for president. Their inclusion into politics places a brand new aspect on the vote outlook in the other state. Nearly 800,000 female voters registered for this first voting of their ballot. The democrats claim practically all of this big vote will go to them, because of the genuine sympathy with the democratic slogan, "He kept us out of the war." The republicans have the firm belief that the women will not be swayed by any "silly sentimentalism," and count on the most of this vote for Hughes because of the republican nominee's outspoken support of the cause of women's suffrage.

Two of Chicago's foremost women—Mrs. Ella Flagg Young and Miss Jane Addams—have been vigorously working for Wilson. Miss Addams is an enthusiastic Roosevelt sup-

REPUBLICAN COMMITTEEMAN SAYS HUGHES WILL WIN BY 50,000—STATE CLAIMED FOR WILSON BY 25,000.

Notice is hereby given that on Tuesday, to-wit: the 14th day of November, A. D. 1916, at the following named polling places, in the City of Klamath Falls, Klamath County, Oregon, to-wit:

First Ward—Polling place, Bank Exchange.
Second Ward—Polling place, New City Hall.
Third Ward—Polling place, Sanderson building.
Fourth Ward—Polling place McDonald's store.
Fifth Ward—Polling place, Reed building, Fairview Addition.
A special election will be held, at which there will be submitted to the qualified voters of said city for their approval or rejection, pursuant to Ordinance No. 186, passed and approved on the 18th day of October, A. D. 1916, an amendment to Section 37, Article IV., of the charter of the City of Klamath Falls, proposed, adopted and submitted by the common council to the qualified voters of the city.

Said proposed amendment is printed in pamphlet form by the city and copies mailed to every legal voter within the city whose address is known, and said pamphlet can be had at the office of the police judge upon application.

The general purport of said charter amendment is expressed in the ballot title adopted by the police judge and the common council, and which will appear upon the ballot, being numbered 300 to 301 and in the following words:

"Shall Section 37, Article IV., of the charter of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, be amended to authorize and empower the common council to buy, build, equip, acquire, maintain and operate railways and railroads operated by steam, electric or other power, and to acquire rights-of-way, terminals, easements and real property, and to bring actions for the condemnation or taking of

private property for public use, and to borrow money and fund indebtedness to carry out any one or more of said powers by issuing and selling the negotiable warrants or bonds of said city to the aggregate amount of three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000.00), bearing interest at not more than six per centum (6 per centum) per annum, and payable semi-annually, said warrants or bonds to be payable in not to exceed fifty (50) years, and providing for the levy and collection of a direct annual ad valorem tax on all the taxable property in said city, in addition to all other taxes, sufficient to pay the principal and interest on said warrants or bonds according to their tenor; and repealing any provision or provisions of the charter of said city in conflict therewith; all of which is more particularly set forth in Ordinance No. 186, passed and approved on the 18th day of October, A. D. 1916, submitting said amendment to the voters of the City of Klamath Falls?"

The said special election will be held commencing at nine o'clock in the morning and the polls will remain open until eight o'clock in the afternoon of said day.
