

NATIONAL LEADER IS STILL IN DOUBT

DUNCAN AND HUMPHREY SUCCESSFUL CADIDATES

D. V. Kuykendall Is Selected as Circuit Judge by Comfortable Majority

Result Hinges on the Three Coast States

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—The republicans claim the following states as certain for Hughes. This would give them 254 electoral votes and only 12 more votes are needed to assure the election of Hughes. The states claimed for Hughes are: Illinois, Connecticut, Wisconsin, Michigan, New York, Indiana, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Maine, Vermont, Delaware, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Iowa, New Jersey, South Dakota, West Virginia and Minnesota.

The democrats claim that Minnesota is still doubtful. Kansas and New Jersey are still claimed by both parties, although Wilson has a slight lead in late returns. It is probable that the coast states of Oregon, California and Washington will decide the election. Wilson has a small lead in Washington. Hughes is ahead in Oregon, and the two presidential candidates are running neck and neck in California.

BURDICK, FORBES ARE SUCCESSFUL

Denton G. Burdick of Redmond and Vernon A. Forbes of Bend have been elected state representatives from this district. Their plurality over Fred W. Hyndman of Klamath Falls is large enough to make their election certain.

The total vote in Klamath and Lake counties, as received up to the time the Herald went to press, shows Burdick polled 1702 votes, Forbes 1912 and Hyndman 1515. Crook county has not been heard from and Midland and Odell precincts in this county are missing.

The Lake county votes was Burdick 382, Forbes 368 and Hyndman 198. Klamath went Burdick 1310, Forbes 1544, Hyndman 1317.

KLAMATH FAVORS DRY AMENDMENT

GIVES SLIGHT MAJORITY OF 115 VOTES FOR TOTAL PROHIBITION OF IMPORTING INTOXICATING LIQUORS.

By a bare margin of 115 votes, the voters of Klamath county yesterday gave their approval of the initiative measure, entitled, an amendment forbidding importation of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes. The total vote, Crescent and Midland not reported, shows the yes vote at 1145 and the no vote at 1030.

This vote is consistent with the large negative vote against the so-called brewers' amendment.

KLAMATH VOTERS RAP SINGLE TAX

VOTERS OF THIS COUNTY SHOW DISLIKE FOR CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT ENSHROUDED IN FANCY LANGUAGE.

By a vote of 561 to 1346, Klamath county voters snubbed under the single tax constitutional amendment, known on the ballot as the full rental value land tax and homesteaders' loan fund amendment. The measure lost overwhelmingly in every precinct of the county.

Commercial Club Levy Fails by 118 Ballots

By a margin of 118 votes, the initiative measure for county maintenance of Klamath Commercial Club failed of passage yesterday at the hands of Klamath county voters.

From the earliest returns it was seen that the vote would be close. Midland and Crescent have not been heard from, but it now appears certain that the measure failed.

The total vote received when the Herald went to press was 1051 yes and 1169 no.

A similar measure was on the ballot two years ago, but received a much smaller affirmative vote then. The club must now rely on support from the few business men and other supporters who have kept it up during the last few years.

BALDWIN LEADING SENATOR CONTEST

IS AHEAD ONLY 92 VOTES, BUT MANY PARTS OF LARGE SENATORIAL DISTRICT HAVE NOT BEEN HEARD FROM.

With no returns received from Crook and Jefferson counties, Judge George T. Baldwin appears to be leading W. Lair Thompson for state senator from this district. If these counties go for Thompson by any considerable majority Baldwin's lead may be overcome.

As the Herald goes to press the vote shows Baldwin ahead by 92 votes. He carried Klamath county by 307 votes while Thompson carried Lake county by 174. Prineville gave Baldwin an advantage of 59 votes, but Bend has not been heard from.

Holman Elected Over Morley

J. M. Holman, republican, defeated Fred Morley, democrat, for constable of Linkville precinct yesterday. The total vote was Holman 865 and Morley 775.

SURPRISES IN YESTERDAY'S RESULTS ARE MANY

Democrats Voted Into Office Far Excess Than Many People Expected. Offices Secured by Them Are Sheriff, District Attorney, Clerk of the Circuit Court, and Commissioner. Henry and Wells Unopposed.

With complete returns from all the larger precincts, with practically complete returns from most of the others, and with only Midland and Odell missing, is it certain that yesterday was a democratic day for Klamath county office-seekers. Where there was opposition, only three republican candidates were successful—Soule, DeLap and Kuykendall.

The election of W. M. Duncan as district attorney over Joseph S. Kent is certain. Based on the returns as stated above, Duncan's vote is 1694 and Kent's is 1573.

Captain J. P. Lee, for many years county assessor, was re-elected to the office as an independent candidate. His total vote is 1593, Bennett's is 875 and Hayden's 958.

George Humphrey, democratic nominee, was elected sheriff over C. C. Low by a majority of 348 votes. The exact vote is 1769 for Humphrey to 1521 for Low.

Burrell Short was elected county commissioner on the democratic ticket over Thad McHattan by an immense majority. Short received 1965 votes while McHattan got 1205. Short was especially strong in the rural districts and held his own fairly well in Klamath Falls.

By a vote of 1690 to 1522, Judge D. V. Kuykendall was re-elected circuit judge over R. C. Groesbeck, democrat, at yesterday's election.

Earl Whitlock, candidate for reelection as coroner on the democratic ticket, lost the race to Dr. A. A. Soule by a vote of 1653 to 1462 for Whitlock.

George Chastain, incumbent, was re-elected to the office of circuit court clerk by a vote of 2081 to 1149 over C. K. Brandenburg, republican nominee.

E. B. Henry for county surveyor and Miss Edna Wells for county school superintendent received large complimentary votes, neither having any opposition.
