**NEW YORK, 10:07 A. M., Nov. 8.** The Brooklyn Eagle gives Hughes 254 and Wilson 253 electoral votes, with California, Oregon and New Mexico doubtful. Wilson wins if he carries California. The democratic national committee claims California and the election of Wilson. Latest returns to this hour indicate Wilson has carried Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Wyoming, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Virginia, Washington, Kansas and Idaho with 256 votes.

**SAN FRANCISCO, 11:51 A. M., Nov. 8.**—4,413 precincts of this state give Wilson plurality slightly over 9,000. The democrats say his election is certain. He has carried San Francisco county by 20,000.

**NEW YORK, 11:51 A. M., Nov. 8.** The republicans claim California and Minnesota. The democrats concede that Hughes is leading in New Hampshire by a few hundred votes. It is reported that Democratic Chairman McCormick intends to ask for a recount of the New Hampshire vote. Complete returns form 150 Minnesota precincts show Wilson leading by 7,000.

## OFFICES GO TO BOTH PARTIES

County Assessor J. P. Lee, running for re-election as an independent candidate after being defeated in the primaries last spring for the democratic nomination by Jasper Bennett, was re-elected assessor yesterday by a large majority. He ran strong in a large number of the precincts, outstripping both the republican nominee, Austin Hayden, and Bennett, the democratic nominee.

Probably the next most important county result was the election of Geo. Humphrey for sheriff over C. C. Low, who has held the office two terms, and sought reelection.

Much to the surprise of many Kent supporters, William M. Duncan, democratic candidate, won the office for district attorney over Joseph S. Kent.

Another successful democratic candidate was Burrell Short, who won over Thaddeus McHattan for county commissioner by a comfortable majority.

Judge D. V. Kuykendall was the successful candidate for circuit judge, winning over R. C. Groesbeck, democratic nominee.

C. R. DeLap, incumbent, was an easy winner for county clerk.

George Haydon had no trouble in election for treasurer over L. Mortenson, socialist candidate.

Dr. A. A. Soule was successful over Earl Whitlock.

E. B. Henry for county surveyor and Miss Edna Wells for county school superintendent, won, having no opposition.

George Chastain, democratic candidate, defeated Clyde Brandenburg for circuit court clerk by a good margin.
