MOST DEATHS DUE TO TUBERCULOSIS, PNEUMONIA

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 11. According to a preliminary announcement with reference to mortality in 1913, issued by Director Sam L. Rogers of the Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce, and compiled under the direction of Richard C. Lippin, chief statistician for vital statistics, nearly one-third of the 999,155 deaths reported for that year in the "registration area," which contained approximately 87 per cent of the population of the entire United States, were due to three causes—heart disease, tuberculosis and pneumonia—and nearly two-thirds were charged to twelve causes—the three just named, together with Bright's disease and nephritis, cancer, apoplexy, diarrhoea and enteritis, arterial disease, diabetes, influenza, diphtheria and typhoid fever.

The deaths from heart disease (specific diseases of the heart and circulatory system) in the registration area in 1913 numbered 185,309, or 18.5 per cent of the population. The death rate from this cause shows a marked increase as compared with 1900, when it was only 13.5 per cent of the population. The increase has not been continuous, the rate having fluctuated from year to year.

Tuberculosis in its various forms claimed 98,194 victims in 1913, or 9.8 per cent of the population. Tells What Fighting From a Tank is Like

LONDON, Oct. 25.—(By mail)—A young Australian soldier, wounded while serving as one of the crew in a "tank," has given the world the first real story of what happens when this newest engine of war goes into action. His diary of a week's work in an armored juggernaut follows:

Monday—Out for the first time. Strange sensation. Bullets rained like hail on a galvanized roof. Suddenly gave a terrible lurch. Lookout said we were astride an enemy trench. "Give 'em hell," was the order. We did. The frightened Germans ran like rabbits, but were shot down in bunches. Machine guns started a vicious rattle on our "hide." Not the least impression. Moved on and caught another German detachment. Cut their ranks to ribbons. Prisoners very curious stared at us wide-eyed. First day's experience not pleasant. "Tank" sickness is as bad as sea-sickness.

Tuesday—Off for another cruise. Peppering began at once. Thought the old tank was going to drown in the shower of bullets. Silly blighters thought they could rush the tank like a fort. We fired at them point blank. We spat at them venomously. The blessed old tub gave a lurch. I thought it was goodbye to earth. It was only some German dead and wounded we had skidded into. Rain of bullets sounded like hundreds of rivets being driven into the tank's hide. We got to like the regular rhythm of it. Heavier strumming on our keyboard. Machine gun at it. There was a tremendous thud along about this time. Whole outfit thought we were done for. Only some unwelcome obstacles along an enemy parapet. Some Hunns tried the rushing dodge. Their rushing days are over.

Wednesday—Early start. Rough and voyage yet. Waves of fire seemed to break over us. Party of Germans came to meet us outside the trenches. Thought it was the mayor and village notables coming to give us a warm welcome. Mistaken. They let fly with machine guns. Then they tried boarding tactics. We laughed. Tank reception party dispersed in cloud of smoke. Only remaining member fat old gentleman, threw himself down before us with many signs of submission.

Thursday—Pinned down the village street of wrecked troops. Hunns

rushed out of cellars and dugouts. One blighter rushed at us with clubbed rifle. Made terrible swipe at tank. Hurt himself more than us. Had nice joy ride after being of feeling Germans. All fat men.

Friday—Early about. Usual shower of bullets. Got right across a trench. Enemy tried to run, but couldn't. Threw up sponge. One cheeky chap said he didn't think it was fair to use such fighting machines. We asked him if he thought we ought to get the Kaiser's permission to use the tanks. Didn't see the joke. Took about 200 prisoners. Killed and wounded as many more. Tired out.

Saturday—Out before breakfast. Terrible crash first thing. Thought we had encountered wandering world. Weathered storm. Rare sport. Enemy preparing for surprise attack. Our surprise came first. We waddled into their ambush. Never saw men so frightened. Only few chaps stayed behind. Went snorting after them wherever we could find them. Later strong detachment tried to make their way back. We lined up across road and gave them hot time. Every time they tried to rush we ripped the tanks to bits. They finally gave up.

Sunday—Frightening Germans continued. Laid out death as you

might vamp out music from a hurdy-gurdy. Fritz got 500. No fight left in him. Prisoners scared to death. Some of them asked as though they believed we used our tanks for making sausages out of prisoners.

SPECIAL CITY ELECTION

Notice is hereby given that on Tuesday, to-wit: the 14th day of November, A. D. 1914, at the following named polling places, in the City of Klamath Falls, Klamath County, Oregon, to-wit:

First Ward—Polling place, Bank Exchange.

Second Ward—Polling place, New City Hall.

Third Ward—Polling place, Sanderson building.

Fourth Ward—Polling place McDonald's store.

Fifth Ward—Polling place, Reed building, Fairview Addition.

A special election will be held, at which there will be submitted to the qualified voters of said city for their approval or rejection, pursuant to Ordinance No. 395, passed and approved on the 16th day of October, A. D. 1914, an amendment to Section 27, Article IV., of the charter of the City of Klamath Falls, proposed, adopted and submitted by the common council to the qualified voters of the city.

Said proposed amendment is printed in pamphlet form by the city and copies mailed to every legal voter within the city whose address is known, and said pamphlet can be had at the office of the police judge upon application.

The general purpose of said charter amendment is expressed in the ballot title adopted by the police judge and the common council, and which will appear upon the ballot, being numbered 300 to 301 and in the following words:

"Shall Section 27, Article IV., of the charter of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, be amended to authorize and empower the common council to buy, build, equip, acquire, maintain and operate railways and railroads operated by steam, electric or other power, and to acquire rights-of-way, terminals, easements and real property, and to bring actions for the condemnation or taking of private property for public use, and to borrow money and fund indebtedness to carry out any one or more of the negotiable warrants or bonds of said city to the aggregate amount of three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000.00), bearing interest at not more than six per centum (6 per centum) per annum, and payable semi-annually, said warrants or bonds to be payable in not to exceed fifty (50) years, and providing for the levy and collection of a direct annual ad valorem tax on all the taxable property in said city, in addition to all other taxes, sufficient to pay the principal and interest on said warrants or bonds according to their tenor; and repealing any provision or provisions of the charter of said city."

In conflict therewith; all of which is more particularly set forth in Ordinance No. 395, passed and approved on the 16th day of October, A. D. 1914, submitting said amendment to the voters of the City of Klamath Falls.

The said special election will be held commencing at nine o'clock in the morning and the polls will remain open until eight o'clock in the afternoon of said day.

The judges and clerks of election are, respectively, the following named qualified electors of the City of Klamath Falls:

In case one or more of said judges or clerks of election shall not be present at the time prescribed for opening the polls, the judges and clerks present may elect any qualified person present to act as such judge or clerk.

No person shall be entitled to vote at such special election who is not a legal voter of the City of Klamath Falls, in accordance with the constitution and laws of the State of Oregon and the charter of said city.
