Mackensen Retreats United Press Service

LONDON, Nov. 13.—Bucharest has wireless that Mackensen's retreat from the Dobrudja front continues, and that he also is retiring from the positions near the Cernavoda bridge. The Russians are bringing up their artillery for the final smash.

The Rumanian enveloping movement at Prodeal continues today.

By shelling Constanta, the Russian fleet is siding in the assault upon this place, held by the right wing of the teuton army.

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 13.—The State Mine Workers Union through its executive committee, today sent resolutions to President Wilson and Governor Willis, demanding a national and state investigation of the high cost of living. The resolution says that "illegal and unfair speculation in food stuffs and other necessities is causing actual hunger and distress in families where the men are steadily employed."

Every Child a Savage

CHICAGO, Nov. 10.—"Every child from 2 to 16 is a savage becoming civilized," said E. Walte Joslyn, in a lecture before the Society of Evolutionists.

"The impulse of every boy to dig caves, hunt, fish and fight is an inheritance from our savage ancestors. A child's fear of the dark is the remnant of the time when the dark places were caves filled with wild animals." Joslyn said rational men existed 50,000 years ago.

Germans Leave Supplies on Abandoning Vaux

WITH THE FRENCH ARMIES AT VERDUN, Nov. 13.—The only German occupant of the shell-scarred battered, but still firm Fort Vaux, when the French triumphantly entered it, was a nondescript dog, and he is now being treated with all the honors of war—but out of German supplies. Such was their haste in abandoning the fort that the Germans left behind a million cartridges, three thousand meat rations, three thousand bottles of mineral water and large quantities of anti-tetanus serums and other drugs now unobtainable outside of Germany.

With their artillery in place, the Fort Vaux garrison now dominates the entire Woivre plains. New lines of German entrenchments are vaguely visible several kilometers off. They are in low, marshy ground, where it will be practically impossible to entrench firmly.

In the twelve hours I was in the fort, from six Wednesday morning until dusk, the Germans shelled it almost constantly, the big projectiles thudding down every moment with clocklike regularity. Some hit the roof, making the whole structure reverberate, but without doing damage.

The garrison was gay and watched with interest while the commandant counted the hits. Lieutenant Diot, the first French soldier to re-enter Vaux, came up and laughingly saluting "Mon Capitain," said: "The question of your observation post has been finally settled. A German shell just destroyed the one you chose, so you will have to take mine."

The first intimation to the French that Vaux had been abandoned came when the Paris wireless picked a German semi-official story to the American press out of the air. The French had then almost entirely surrounded the fort and were shelling it with four hundred millimeter guns with a precision which would have

First Ward—Polling place, Bank Exchange. Second Ward—Polling place, New City Hall.

Fifth Ward—Polling place, Reed building, Fairview Addition. A special election will be held, at which there will be submitted to the qualified voters of said city for their approval or rejection, pursuant to Ordinance No. 396, passed and approved on the 16th day of October, A. D. 1916, an amendment to Section 37, Article IV, of the charter of the City of Klamath Falls, proposed, adopted and submitted by the common council to the qualified voters of the city.

Said proposed amendment is printed in pamphlet form by the city and copies mailed to every legal voter within the city whose address is known, and said pamphlet can be had at the office of the police judge upon application.

The general purport of said charter amendment is expressed in the ballot title adopted by the police judge and the common council, and which will appear upon the ballot, being numbered 300 to 301 and in the following words:

"Shall Section 37, Article IV, of the charter of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, be amended to authorize and empower the common council to buy, build, equip, acquire, maintain and operate railways and railroads operated by steam, electric or other power, and to acquire rights-of-way, terminals, easements and real property, and to bring actions for the condemnation or taking of private property for public use, and to borrow money and fund indebtedness to carry out any one or more of said powers by issuing and selling the negotiable warrants or bonds of said city to the aggregate amount of three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000.00), bearing interest at not more than six per centum (6 per centum) per annum, and payable semi-annually, said warrants or bonds to be payable in not to exceed fifty (50) years, and providing for the levy and collection of a direct annual ad valorem tax on all the taxable property in said city, in addition to all other taxes, sufficient to pay the principal and interest on said warrants or bonds according to their tenor; and repealing any provision or provisions of the charter of said city

In conflict therewith; all of which is more particularly set forth in Ordinance No. 396, passed and approved on the 24th day of October, A. D. 1916, submitting said amendment to the voters of the City of Klamath Falls?"
