

STRAHORN ROAD TO GO UP LINK RIVER

TO FOLLOW WEST SIDE, CROSSING IT TWO TIMES

Crosses Espee Tracks South of Savidge Plant

RAILROAD BUILDER ANNOUNCES LINE OF NEW ROAD

Oregon-California & Eastern Will Follow Straight Line From Olene to Link River, Passing Through City Park Grounds on Lake Ewauna, Crossing Klamath Avenue and Then Link River Near Bridge.

Now that the tension incident to the railroad bond election has been somewhat relieved, attention is being generally focused upon the location of the line through the city that Robert E. Strahorn today responds to the Herald's request for definite information upon the subject.

"As you may be aware," he says, "we have run five preliminary lines over that many feasible routes. Three of these have been found fairly acceptable. One parallels the Southern Pacific main line, necessitating location of yards and terminals east of those of the Southern Pacific near the crossing of Main street; another passes nearly through the center of the city, necessitating an expensive tunnel and more objectionable features in the way of cutting up your best business and residential section, while the third is the route up Link River—or rather this should be treated as two routes, one up the east and the other up the west side of the river.

"This last named route now seems to be most respects the best, not interfering with the many beautiful homes on the east bank, or having any other objectionable points, except the river crossings. I have decided that we will stand for these for the general good, and this route may therefore be considered adopted, unless some unexpected and quite serious obstacle arises.

"We are therefore making final location, coming in on an absolutely straight line all the way from Olene, crossing the Southern Pacific main line on about what would be Third street extended, proceeding westward to a point near the city blocks and city park, over which we enter Klamath

MEXICANS FIGHT FIERCE BATTLE

ath avenue. Then for a few hundred feet through Klamath avenue to the river. After crossing, the line follows as near the river bank as possible to the Upper Lake, where it crosses to the east bank and proceeds through Shippington to the temporary terminus in the vicinity of the Pelican Bay mill.

"This gives us very easy grades all the way on a route which is least objectionable from all standpoints to the city generally, and the line thus located will best serve every industry which ever may be established on Lake Ewauna or around the lower end of Upper Lake."

OFFICIAL STATEMENT SHOWS \$108.50 FOR CAMPAIGN

Office of County Commissioner Costs Burrel Short \$75, Much of Which Was For Car Repair Occasioned By Trip After Votes—Republicans Gave to the County Central Committee.

It cost George Humphrey \$108.50 to be elected sheriff of Klamath county for the next two years, according to his official statement of expenses filed today with County Clerk DeLoe, as prescribed by law. An itemized statement of this expense is not included.

Burrel Short, elected county commissioner, spent \$75 in the campaign itemized as follows: Advertising \$15, repairs on car \$15, gasoline \$10, meals \$25, lodging \$10.

C. K. Brandenburg, candidate for circuit court clerk, spent \$74.40, as follows: Contribution to republican central committee \$40, traveling \$18, postage \$1, cards \$6, hotel bills \$9.40.

George Chastain, successful candidate for circuit court clerk, expended \$33.35 in the campaign for the following items: Traveling \$25, cards \$8.35.

A. A. Soule, coroner-elect, spent \$26.60, as follows. Contribution to republican central committee \$10, traveling \$5, Merrill Times \$4.50, W. O. Smith Printing Company, \$7.10.

To date, no other candidates have filed their statements of expenses. These must be filed by December 7, or thirty days after election.

REPUBLICANS DO NOT ADMIT LOSS

ADMISSION OF HUGHES' DEFEAT WILL DEPEND ON ADVICES FROM CALIFORNIA AFTER OFFICIAL COUNT IS COMPLETED

United Press Service. NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—With only a few precincts missing, official and unofficial returns give New Mexico to Woodrow Wilson by 3,039 votes.

The recount in Hennepin county, Minnesota, which includes Minneapolis, began today. Hughes leads in the state now by 289 votes.

It is indicated the Republican admission of Hughes' defeat will depend upon what California leaders advise after the official count in that state is finished.

Some New Faces for United States Senate

The United States senate will, after March 4, look like a new body, so many new faces will appear. Here are just a few of them. One of the most interesting changes was that in the senatorship of Rhode Island where Senator Lippitt was defeated by Peter Goelet Gerry, the wealthy young society man, who broke into the house of representatives four years ago. Hiram W. Johnson, who was the progressive candidate for vice president, will sit in the senate; Frank Kellogg, the trust buster, will be another new senator; James E. Watson, the old timer of the house, will also sit there, with Harry S. New two of the shrewdest politicians in the nation. Wm. M. Calder of New York has long been a figure in the house.

Klamath Falls Business Houses

PROBABLY no city of its size on the coast is as well supplied with retail business houses as is Klamath Falls. The big establishments in this city, in every line of business, are exceptionally well stocked and offer a greater variety of goods than those in much larger cities.

Klamath Falls is now attracting the attention of investors and business men throughout the coast and in more distant states, and it is safe to figure that within the coming months many inquiries will be made by business men in all lines, with a view of locating in Klamath Falls. Now this county needs more farmers, sawmills, factories and plants that will give employment to labor and add to the growth and development of the county, but it is a mistake to figure that more stores and business houses, under the present amply supplied conditions, will mean lower prices for goods.

On the contrary, too many stores in the same line will mean a division of trade and the loss of profits both for the stores already established and for any new ventures. It naturally follows that with less volume of business, retail prices must advance or such stores must operate at a loss, which means only one thing—bankruptcy.

We believe that some steps should be taken to furnish reliable information to prospects looking for business locations in Klamath Falls. Business failures are a bad thing for any community, and the men who have already made heavy investments here, and are giving such excellent service, deserve the protection of the citizens who are benefited. This should be borne in mind in furnishing information. Be sure to give the actual facts. The truth is always best.

GREAT INDUSTRIAL STRUGGLE IS NEAR

GERMANS EJECTED FROM FESSOIRE

FRENCH RETAKE POSITIONS AFTER VIOLENT BATTLE THIS MORNING—CENTRAL POWERS RETIRE IN MACEDONIA.

PARIS, Nov. 16.—After a violent battle this morning, the French dislodged the Germans occupying Fessoire, after the heavy attacks of yesterday. The Germans used three divisions of troops and lost heavily.

The Franco-Russian forces are four miles south of Monastir. The Bulgarian officials admit that the central powers have retired from the fighting here and elsewhere in Macedonia.

BERLIN, Nov. 16.—The Germans have captured the eastern part of Sully-Salleuel.

British attacks near here and at Serre, southeast of Beaumont and near Grandcourt have been repulsed.

LONDON, Nov. 16.—The Germans again today are directing fierce counterattacks on every allied position along the Somme.

The Russians in Transylvania have captured fortifications southeast of Toldevesh.

After several violent combats the Rumanians have withdrawn from Aroful toward Radaciestil. The Rumanians are retaining their positions in the Jiu Valley.

The Russian advance at Dobradja continues.

WILL BE HISTORY'S GREATEST FIGHT OF THIS KIND

American Federation Believed Ready to Launch War for Eight Hour Day for All Laboring Classes—Capital Forms Gigantic Board to Fight All Legislation Such as Recent Adamson Law.

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—With capitalists employing 7,000,000 persons, forming a National Industrial Conference Board, proposing to watch closely all industrial legislation and eliminate alleged favoritism to labor, prospects for history's greatest industrial struggle are increasing daily.

The conference board will fight all legislation such as the Adamson law. The railroads have virtually abandoned all hope of settling with the brotherhoods, although they say they are ready to meet the brotherhoods again.

More injunction suits against the Adamson law are in course of preparation.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.—The formation of the National Industrial Conference Board were discussed today by officials of the American Federation of Labor, in convention here.

The appearance here of leaders of the railway brotherhoods is expected to cause the inauguration of a nation wide fight by labor for an eight hour work day for all classes of the employed.

Labor leaders say they intend to secure this with the force of labor itself, and not with legislation.

WILSON GAINS IN CANVASS RECOUNT

NOW LEADS IN COUNTIES RAYING OFFICIAL RETURNS BY 10-107—HUGHES LEADS IN OTHERS BY 6,287.

United Press Service. SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 16.—Official returns from 51 of California's 58 counties give Woodrow Wilson a lead of 10,103 popular votes. This is a gain of 479, as the same counties unofficially gave Wilson a lead of 9,628.

In the counties where the official count is not completed Hughes led in the unofficial returns by 6,287.

LENNOX BOWLERS LEAD TOURNAMENT

Government Begins Its Fight for Adamson Bill

United Press Service. WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 16. It is indicated here today that the administration is ready to start an aggressive fight for the Adamson railroad bill. Government officials believe that the efforts of the railroads to enjoin operation of the law will fail. Some of President Wilson's advisers expressed the opinion today that if the railroads block enforce-

ment of the law, causing a strike, the supreme court will hold the railroads responsible for interference with interstate commerce and compel them to abide by the law's provisions. Preparations for government action are proceeding rapidly. It is probable that demurrers to the suit filed by the railroads yesterday will quickly bring the constitutionality of the law before the supreme court.
