MISS RANKIN TO WORK FOR WOMEN

FIRST WOMAN REPRESENTATIVE IN THE NATIONAL CONGRESS ANNOUNCES HER INTENTIONS REGARDING LEGISLATION

MISSOULA, Mont., Nov. 16.—"I am going to Washington to represent the women and children of the West—to work for an eight hour day for women, and for laws providing that women shall be paid the same wages as men for equal amounts of work."

Miss Jeanette Rankin, newly elected republican congressman—or congresswoman—from Montana, was being as she said this today. Even after entering politics she refused to forsake the old household arts, cooking and needlework. Miss Rankin failed to become excited when returns showed she was running ahead of the republican ticket in Montana, and later that she was elected.

"I'm glad of this chance," was her comment when cheering friends "broke the news."

"Of course," said Miss Rankin today, "I know I'll be the first woman member of congress, but I won't be the last, and I believe I'll be received with courtesy and as an equal by the Eastern congressmen, even though they are enemies of suffrage. While working for suffrage in the East, I found that no matter how strenuously our opponents fought against us, they were always ready to hear our side."

In addition to her eight hour and equal wage laws, Miss Rankin intends to fight for woman suffrage from the moment she gets into the capital. Her suffrage bill, she says, will be one of the first introduced at the next session. She also declares her intention of seeking extension of the child labor laws, mothers' pension and universal education.

As a fighter Miss Rankin believes she will make some of the oldest battles in the house break ground. Not so long ago she tramped through deep snow potting bears and wolves just for pastime. Her father came to Montana when it was an empty wilderness, and his four daughters endured all the hardships of pioneers. Miss Rankin showed the Montana republican organization some of her fighting qualities in the last few days of the campaign. Opposed by the G. O. P. leaders in many towns, she went ahead with the Montana Good Government League's backing, kept her own republican banner waving, and made speeches in every city and hamlet in Montana. In addition, she organized a telephone round-up. On election day her friends called every telephone number in the state, and asked whoever answered if a vote had been cast for Miss Rankin yet.

Look for Naval Battles on French Canals Soon

LONDON, Nov. 16.—Inland navies may figure strongly soon in the war news from the western front. Constant pressure on the German front by the Anglo-French, according to the British war experts, must inevitably mean a withdrawal of the German line now lying across Northern France and Flanders. This would throw the allies' line near and across various canals and rivers, and bring a new branch of warfare into play. This new branch would be the inland navies—river and canal cruisers mounting fairly heavy guns and manned by experienced men.

As first announced by the United Press correspondent on the French front, General Foch's canal navy has already been in action against heavy German guns mounted on Mount St. Quentin. These units, mostly monitors, operate silently and slowly on the canals skirting the crooked course of the River Somme. But in the extreme north of France and South of Belgium, it is pointed out, rivers and canals are more spacious, and afford real opportunities for maneuvering. These waterways also interlock so that separate fleets and units may extend their activity to many areas.

Neither ordinary soldiers or sailors would operate the land locked navies. Such services as England's Royal Marine Light Infantry and the Royal Marine Artillery would serve. These men are highly trained for such work as are their corresponding units in the French service. The recent official announcement here that Sir Archibald Paris and other marine generals have been sent to the front lends flavor to the conjecture regarding the inland navies.

That the Germans may have already organized their inland navy is indicated by the appearance of great numbers of German marines on the Somme front. Some of these have been captured.

JOHNSON TO HAVE AFFAIRS OWN WAY

GOVERNOR OF CALIFORNIA WILL FAMILY CONTROL SENATE, BUT PROBABLY WILL HAVE OPPOSITION IN THE HOUSE

SACRAMENTO, Nov. 15.—Governor Johnson will have things pretty much his own way when the next legislature convenes, according to men who have studied the returns from the recent election.

Only three of the twenty state senators elected are democrats, and of the seventeen republicans, there are said to be only three who might be classed as against Johnson.

In the assembly the "anti-Johnson" crowd will be of considerable force—so much so that an effort will be made to put an anti-Johnson man in the speaker's chair. A. L. Bartlett or Los Angeles or J. A. Pettis of Fort Bragg will be offered. Governor Johnson, whose friends have forty-five or fifty of the eighty assembly votes, is said to favor putting C. C. Young of Berkeley back in the speakership.

Thirty-nine of the incoming assemblymen are either lawyers or real estate men. The lawyers total exactly thirty. There are five farmers, two salesmen, two clerks, two carpenters and two newspaper men among the others. Nine of the new assemblymen are democrats.

Since Johnson intends to remain as chief executive until the legislature gets well under way, William D. Stephens, who is to be governor after Johnson resigns to enter the United States senate, will find his duties for the present confined to presiding over the senate.

Incidentally, six of the new legislators will have to give up their present positions and look around for new ones, because the initiative measure to keep lawmakers from holding steady state jobs was adopted at the last election. The six are: Senator W. A. Daniels, San Francisco, state harbor commissioner; Senator H. H. Hyon, Los Angeles, deputy harbor commissioner; Assemblyman W. R. Collins, San Francisco, state employment bureau; Assemblyman J. J. Hayes, San Francisco, state prison board; Assemblyman F. H. Mouser, Los Angeles, motor vehicle department.
