

MONASTIRIS CAPTURED BY ALLIES

Serbian Flag Flies Over City Long Held by the Turks

CENTRAL POWERS TO LEAVE ATHENS SOON

AMBASSADORS MUST LEAVE THE GREEK CAPITAL WEDNESDAY

German Repel British in Fight in the Western Theater of War—Serbians Pursue Germans as They Retreat From Monastir, Evacuating It to the Serbian and French Forces.

United Press Service LONDON, Nov. 20.—After its evacuation by the Germans, French, Serbians and Russians yesterday entered Monastir. Everywhere in the city the Serbian flag is hoisted. A temporary Serbian capital will be established in Monastir immediately.

Crown Prince Alexander of Serbia is 56 miles northwest of Salonika, is built at the west end of a plain in a recess formed by lofty mountains. It is an important central station for military operations and has been the goal of the Serbian forces for many months. The majority of the inhabitants are Greeks and Bulgarians, the Turkish residents being mostly soldiers or officials.

United Press Service LONDON, Nov. 20.—Athens reports that the allies have notified the German, Austrian, Bulgarian and Turkish ambassador to Greece to leave the country by Wednesday. Sola claims that renewal allied attacks near Monastir have been repelled.

United Press Service BERLIN, Nov. 20.—The British have been driven from the western part of Grandcourt. British attacks in the Ancre district have been repelled.

United Press Service LONDON, Nov. 20.—The Serbians and French are energetically pursuing the Teutons retreating from Monastir. The Dutch minister at Berlin has been instructed to notify Germany of the "painful impression" Holland has received because of German deportation of Belgians from Belgium.

CHINAMAN'S SOURCE IS A REAL PARTY

United Press Service SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 20.—The average American who goes on a "some party" is a pikar beside the "heathen Chinese" when he goes out for a Basshanallan carnival, according to Sergeant Maulen of the Chinatown squad. When the Chinese wants to go on a tear, he starts playing the drunk game, which usually winds up in "some party," said Maulen. "The game is played by any number of men, one of whom holds out a certain number of fingers quickly and asks the others to guess the number. If they don't guess right, they must take a drink, and the more they drink the more mistakes they make. It's just one round after another."

AMERICANS FROM PARRAL UNHURT

FIVE EMPLOYEES OF MINING COMPANY REACH WEST COAST OF MEXICO SAFELY AFTER TRAVELING FIFTEEN DAYS.

Wilson Hears Labor's Views on Strike Laws

United Press Service WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 20. President Wilson late this afternoon confers with the executives of four of the railroad brotherhoods at the white house. It is declared that the brotherhoods' chief desire is "merely to pay their respects to the president." They will visit him just before his conference with Congressman Adamson on the proposed industrial disputes settlement legislation.

It is believed likely that the brotherhoods will tell President Wilson their personal opposition, supported by that of the American Federation of Labor, to any legislation impairing the right of labor to strike.

New Cars Arriving PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 20.—So far the Southern Pacific lines in Oregon have received 100 of the system's 2,000 freight cars now coming from an Eastern factory, and more are coming at the rate of fifteen to thirty daily. These cars are of the latest type, and have a capacity of fifty tons.

Boys Play Bear; Brother Is Shot United Press Service REDDING, Cal., Nov. 20.—Charles Porter, aged 20, mistaking his brother Allan for a bear, shot and killed him in their mountain cabin last night. The boys, who are orphans, had been reading novels when Allan covered his face to frighten Charles.

TRANSPORTATION IS BEING INVESTIGATED

JEFFERSON COUNTY HAS LOW RATE OF ASSESSMENT

CULVER Ore., Nov. 20.—Jefferson county was primarily formed to reduce taxes, and the levy last year did so, the levy here being but two-thirds of that of Crook county, from which Jefferson county was cut off. During the coming year the levy will be about three mills less than that of the past year, if the county court votes the budget as it has been tentatively prepared, the new levy providing for a tax of only 15 1/2 mills. The budget provides \$25,000 for roads and enough to pay all the expenses of the county. The valuation of property in this county is much greater than it was last year, owing to the fact that many homesteads have been patented since the former levy, and they are now subject to taxation.

Interstate Commerce Commission Begins Exhaustive Probe of Entire Transportation Problem, Including Telephone and Telegraph—State Railroad Commission Is Jealous of Their Powers.

United Press Service WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 20. Every phase of transportation, including telephone and telegraph service, will be required into and an investigation covering federal control and government ownership made to determine whether or not the interstate commerce commission is overloaded, according to Chairman Newlands of the joint committee, which now is investigating the transportation problem. The joint interstate commerce committee spent all of this morning classifying witnesses and this afternoon is in an executive session. Presidents of many railroads have asked for a hearing of their contentions, but thus far the brotherhoods have not asked representation at the hearings of the committee. It is understood that the various state railroad commissions intend to fight any effort to weaken their control. Many cities, telephone, telegraph and express companies and livestock men have telegraphed asking for hearings.

MURDERER GETS LIFE United Press Service AUBURN, Nov. 20.—Edward J. Lilly, confessed slayer of Thomas R. Barleton, today was sentenced to life imprisonment at Folsom. The sheriff left for the penitentiary with the prisoner immediately.

Trevino Expects Attack United Press Service EL PASO, Nov. 20.—Refugees arriving from Juarez say Chihuahua City citizens momentarily are expecting a Villista attack. General Trevino, Carranzista commander in charge of the city, is impressing all men into the army.
