

ENGLAND AGREES TO FOOD LIMIT

NO CRITICISM IS HEARD IN THE ISLAND EMPIRE AGAINST PROPOSED FOOD DICTATORSHIP PROGRAM.

LONDON, Nov. 20.—England is a unit today of the supporters of the government's food dictatorship plan. Not a newspaper or an individual, apparently in the whole United Kingdom voiced criticism of the plan announced in parliament a few days ago by Walter Runciman, contemplating conservation of England's food supply. The only criticisms heard were that the governmental control had been overlong delayed and the preliminary plans, as announced, were insufficiently sweeping or drastic.

It is known, however, that Runciman's announcement was purely preliminary and that he did not reveal all the steps of control which the government has determined upon. The food dictatorship, it was said, may eventually extend even the thoroughness of the German system.

The British people are fully prepared for the sacrifices which it is realized will be consequent upon operation of the new plan. The public is all the more willing to submit to the hardships of a controlled food supply in view of the thrilling stories of British army heroism now reaching here.

It was accepted here that the first activities of the new dictatorship would have to do with limitation on the use of sugar in costly confectionery, of indiscriminate feeding to animals of vegetables suitable for human consumption, and of wasteful use of white flour and potatoes.

Retail food prices, according to semi-official statistics available today, show that in a year there has been an increase of about 27 per cent. Prices now are about 75 per cent higher than they were prior to the war. But on such staples as eggs, potatoes, fish and sugar, the prices have nearly doubled.

NOTICE

Is hereby given that the Keno Power Company will, on the 11th day of December, 1916, apply to the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls for a franchise for the purpose and for the time and rates as embodied in the following ordinance:

Ordinance No.

An ordinance giving and granting to the Keno Power Company, its successors or assigns, a franchise and rights to erect, maintain, use and remove poles, wires, cables, ducts, appliances and apparatus for conducting and using electricity in, under and upon any and all streets, alleys, roads and ways in the City of Klamath Falls, in the County of Klamath, State of Oregon, within the limits and boundaries of said city, as said city now is, or hereafter may be bounded and constituted, and have its limits and to supply electric energy to the people and inhabitants of the City of Klamath Falls, and to the public, and to charge and collect tolls therefor.

The City of Klamath Falls Ordains as follows:

Section 1. That the Keno Power Company, a corporation of Oregon, its successors or assigns, for and during the term hereinafter provided, be, and hereby are granted, subject to the considerations and conditions in this ordinance contained, a franchise and right, but not an exclusive franchise and right, to erect, maintain use and remove poles, wires, cables, ducts, appliances and apparatus for providing and using electricity in, under, upon and over any and all streets, alleys, roads, and ways of, or in said city, within the limits and boundaries of said city, as the same is now or hereafter may be bounded, constituted, and have its limits, both for the purpose of furnishing and supplying electrical energy for any and all purposes to the public and to the people and inhabitants of the said City of Klamath Falls, and of enabling or assisting the Keno Power Company, its successors or assigns, to carry on and conduct its or their business elsewhere than in said city, as now or hereafter bounded and constituted, in supplying other towns, cities, their inhabitants and the public with electricity; also the franchise and right to furnish and supply to the public and to the people and inhabitants of the City of Klamath Falls electricity for any and all purposes, and to establish, charge and collect tolls and charges therefor.

Section 2. The said Keno Power Company, its successors or assigns, shall erect, maintain and use such

pay said cost, to be made by the said Keno Power Company, its successors or assigns, before the opening of any such street, road or way shall be begun.

Section 5. Extensions to the existing distributing system of the said Keno Power Company, authorized by the terms of this franchise, shall be made throughout the said city when necessary to meet the reasonable demands of the growth of said city, and the said Keno Power Company, its successors or assigns, shall furnish during the life of this franchise reasonable, adequate and safe service equipment and facilities within said City of Klamath Falls, and co-extensive with any connecting company furnishing such service.

Section 6. Said Keno Power Company, its successors or assigns, hereby agrees and covenants to indemnify and save harmless the City of Klamath Falls, and the officers thereof against all damages, costs and expenses whatsoever to which it or they may be subject in consequence of the acts of the said Keno Power Company, its successors or assigns, or its or their agents or servants, in any manner arising from the rights and privileges hereby granted.

Section 7. All rights, authority and grants herein contained or conferred are also conditioned upon the understanding and agreement that these privileges in the streets, alleys, roads or ways of the city are not to be exercised in any way so as to be an enhancement of said Keno Power Company's property or value or to be an asset or item of ownership in any personal estate in the event that the value of the property of the said Keno Power Company, its successors or assigns, devoted to the public use within said City of Klamath Falls, shall ever be in issue in any proceeding or controversy involving the creation of rates or services to be afforded within said city by said Keno Power Company, its successors or assigns.

This franchise and grant shall not be construed as any limitation upon the said City of Klamath Falls through its proper officers to grant rights or privileges or authority to other persons or corporations similar to, or different than those herein set forth in the same streets, alleys, roads or ways of the said city.

Section 8. All rights and privileges hereby granted shall terminate at the expiration of fifty (50) years from the date of the acceptance of the terms and conditions of this ordinance by the said Keno Power Company, and in the event that the said Keno Power Company shall fail or neglect or refuse to perform the obligations and requirements called for by this ordinance this grant and privilege shall be terminated and annulled by the Council or other legislative body of the City of Klamath Falls, and the said Keno Power Company, its successors and assigns, shall forfeit all rights and privileges hereby granted.

Section 9. The rights and privileges granted by this ordinance are granted upon the conditions herein contained and also upon the following considerations and conditions, to-wit:

First—That the said Keno Power Company shall, within thirty (30) days from and after the passage and approval of this ordinance, file with the Recorder of the City of Klamath Falls its written acceptance of this ordinance granted to, and conferred upon, said Keno Power Company, its successors or assigns, subject to all of the terms, obligations, restrictions, and provisions in this ordinance contained, and upon the expiration of the allotted time for the acceptance of this ordinance, the same not having been accepted unconditionally, this ordinance shall become wholly void, inoperative and to no effect.

Second—That the said Keno Power Company, its successors or assigns, shall permit the City of Klamath Falls to have the right to string wires on all of the poles of the said Keno Power Company, its successors or assigns, for municipal, fire, police and water departments, and for municipal telephone and telegraph systems, provided that the same shall be so strung as to interfere as little as possible with the wires of said Keno Power Company, its successors or assigns, and further, that the Keno Power Company, its successors or assigns, shall not be responsible for any damage resulting to the wires or property of the city, or injuries to persons, resulting from the using of its said poles by the city.

Third—That all of the physical property of the Keno Power Company, its successors or assigns, constructed, installed, used, or intended to be used, within the said city in, or in connection with the operation of the plant of the said Keno Power Company, constructed, installed, maintained and used under the provisions of this ordinance from and after the construction of installation, or the acquisition of title thereto by the Keno Power Company, its successors or assigns, be subject to the provisions of this section.

Fourth—That the said Keno Power Company, its successors or assigns, shall not, during the term of this franchise, sell, assign, transfer or convey this franchise, or any portion of its physical property in said city subject to the provisions of this ordinance, without the consent of the Council of the City of Klamath Falls, expressed by the ordinance first obtained, and that upon obtaining such

consent all of the provisions shall inure to and apply to, and bind the successors and assigns of the said Keno Power Company; and whenever the said Keno Power Company shall be mentioned in this ordinance it shall be understood to include such successors or assigns in interest of the Keno Power Company as shall have been so consented to by the Council.

Section 10. Said Keno Power Company, its successors or assigns, shall render the service as hereby authorized, to be supplied by the best apparatus known to the science of electricity, to secure the least danger to life or property compatible with the best obtainable service, and such service shall be supplied on equal terms under like conditions, and without unjust discrimination, or without undue preference to any commercial user within said City of Klamath Falls; and at all times the power and right to reasonably regulate and exercise the rights and privileges of the franchise hereby granted and determined shall be vested in the Council of said City, subject to the general laws of the State of Oregon.

Section 11. The use of the poles or other equipment on, over or under any street, alley, road or way in the said city, under the provisions of this ordinance shall be upon the express terms that the said Keno Power Company, its successors or assigns, shall, for a reasonable compensation, permit the use of the same by any other public utility, whenever public convenience or necessity requires such use, and such use will not result in irreparable injury to the owner or other users of such poles or other equipment, nor in any way be a detriment to the service to be rendered by such owners or other users. The said parties shall share the cost necessarily thereby, as they may agree thereon and may agree upon rules and regulations therefor, subject to the provisions of the general laws of this State; but in case they cannot agree, the Council reserves the power to determine the amount and proportions of such payments, and to make all reasonable rules and regulations to govern the same, subject to such general laws of the State as may be applicable.

Section 12. That in consideration of the rights and privileges herein granted, and as compensation for this franchise, grantee shall pay to the City of Klamath Falls two and one-half (2 1/2) per cent of annual gross receipts, payable annually, not later than July 10. Provided, however, that at the expiration of the period for which this franchise is granted, the City of Klamath Falls, at its own election, may purchase and take over to itself the property and plant of the said Keno Power Company, its successors or assigns, in its entirety.

Section 13. The Keno Power Company, its successors or assigns, are hereby granted the right and privilege of demanding and charging from their patrons for electric lighting and electric power, heating and other uses of electricity contemplated under the provisions hereof, not to exceed the following rates:

 - (a) 5c per K. W. H. (5x2 D. L. F.) 10-hour base.
 - (2) Motors—
 - (a) 6c per K. W. H. (5x2 D. L. F.) 10-hour base.
 - (b) 5c per K. W. H. (5x2 D. L. F.) 24-hour base.

- (3) Heating—
 - (a) 5c per K. W. H. (5x2 D. L. F.) 10-hour base.
- (1) Lighting: Commercial—
 - (a) 1c per watt month for 100 watts or less.
 - (b) 0.5c per watt month for all over 100 watts.
 - (c) 0.25c per watt month for advertising.
- (2) Lighting: Residential—
 - (a) 1c per watt month for 100 watts or less.
 - (b) 0.25c per watt month for all over 100 watts.
- (3) Power—
 - (a) \$2 per h. p. month.
 - (b) \$1 per h. p. month up to 3 h. p. for domestic use.
 - (c) \$20 per h. p. for irrigation or drainage only.
- (4) Heating—
 - (a) 0.2c per watt month up to 1000 watts.
 - (b) 0.1c per watt month for all over 1000 watts.
- (a) Lighting—
 - (a) 2c per K. W. H.
- (b) Motors—
 - (a) 1.5c per K. W. H.
- (c) Heating—
 - (a) 1.5c per K. W. H.
 - (b) \$1 per h. p. month.
 - (c) Three Phase, \$1.50 per month.

Minimum Rates.

(a) Lighting—

(c) Heating—

\$20 for 40 h. p. or over.

Section 14. Whenever it shall become necessary to cut the wires of said company erected under this privilege for the purpose of removing buildings, or for any other legitimate purposes, the same shall be done and the wires replaced by and at the expense of said company, or its successors or assigns, upon receiving 24 hours notice from any person, firm or corporation that desires to and has received permission to remove any building or structure, the moving of which will necessitate the cutting or raising of the wires of said company.
