HEAD OF ENGINEERS MAKES DIRE THREAT

SPEAKS TODAY BEFORE HQ LABOR CONVENTION

Says There Will Be Unfinished Business Before Country If Night-Hour Day on Railroads Does Not Prevail—Affiliation of Brotherhoods with Labor Federation Is Believed Probable.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 21.—President Stone, of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, addressing the American Federation of Labor today, said: "There is going to be an eight-hour day on railroads or there will be unfinished business before our country."

Leaders of the other brotherhoods did not express the purposes of their organizations if the Adamson bill is blocked from operation. The affiliation of the four brotherhoods with the American Federation of Labor appeared likely after today's session of the executives of each.

Now, therefore, notice is hereby given by said State Board of Fish and Game Commissioners that that portion of Crane creek between its source and the county road, on the following described land, to-wit: the west half of the northeast quarter, Section 35, Township 33 South, Range 6 East, Willamette Meridian, all being in Klamath county, State of Oregon, be and the same is hereby declared closed to fishing for trout and other fish from and after December 15, 1916, to December 15, 1919. And it is and shall be unlawful to take or fish for trout or other fish in any of the above closed waters during the period of time above specified.
