British Officers Throw
Mustache in the Discard

LONDON, Nov. 7.—(By mail)—And it came to pass that those in command of England's new army re-elected, saying: "Wherefore we have made burthenome the lives of our younger officers in that we require adornment of the upper lip let there be modification of our order, leaving to the discretion of the wearer the matter of facial decoration."

Perhaps not in those words, but somewhat in that manner, the famous order requiring British officers to wear mustaches has been placed among the relics of the world war. Originally paragraph 1,696 of the King's Regulations read as follows: "The hair of the head will be kept short and the chin and under lip will be shaved, but not the upper lip. Whiskers, if worn, will be of moderate length."

From this ukase have been stricken the words "but not the upper lip." Hence, the British officer today may or may not cultivate a mustache, according to his own inclination or that of his wife or sweetheart. But here is where the rub comes in—the chin and under lip must be shaven. Those desiring a beard are forced to grow either a Dundraff or mutton chops, neither of which is considered becoming.

On the memorable day when the mustache order was modified, barbershops looked like recruiting offices.
