IRRIGATION PROJECT BONDS ARE CARRIED

PRINEVILLE, Nov. 24.—Bonds in the sum of \$1500,000 were authorized by a vote of 50 for and 28 against the proposition by the land owners of the Ochoco irrigation district. The bonds will bear six per cent interest and mature in 20 years.

Owing to the fact that all the land within the district is privately owned and more than 35 per cent is already in a high state of cultivation, little difficulty is anticipated in the sale of the bonds.

The successful completion of the Ochoco project means much to Prineville, as nearly the entire \$1,000,000 will be spent here within the next two years. The large land holdings will necessarily be cut up and several thousand new people will be added to the population of Crook county.
