I believe I am speaking for a considerable number of the farmers of this community when saying that the work accomplished and that undertaken for the future by the office of the county agriculturist would receive a more serious setback, and do a greater financial harm to the taxpayers than the small amount of money saved through the abolishment of the office would benefit them.

The recent institute, thanks to Mr. Glazier's efforts, has been of considerable interest, and has helped to keep awake the interest and incentive to scientific and progressive farming. The farm survey to be undertaken during 1917, is just what we need here; and when the data is compiled it will help to open the eyes of many a struggling, debt-ridden farmer, and show him the way to a more remunerative style of rotation and method of farming.

Of course, it is easy to understand that the town people may not see much benefit in the county agriculturist, but I know we farmers would be seriously handicapped if this office and its work were abandoned. And when we come down to it, even here, the farmer is the mainstay of the town and its business.

The rich walk while the poor ride out. Ah! truly things are turned about.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—(By mail)—If you're afraid to go home in the dark these days you'd better not venture out after tea time in London these days, or rather nights. You feel as if you had been transported back into the medieval or, more fittingly, the dark ages, when you step blinking like an owl into the murky, dimly lighted thoroughfares.

I for one am glad that most of the theaters give daily matinees and but two night performances a week. It is far from a cozy thing after the play to be all alone in London in the dark, and on the outside of a taxi looking in, with absolutely no hope of being on the inside looking out.

The price of petrol is so high and the chauffeurs are so scarce that taxis at nightfall become as fleeting and elusive as bate awing. Taxi drivers are now known as "haughties," so fastidious and particular have they become about their fares. If they size you up and like your looks, even then you mustn't be too optimistic. They may not like your destination, and refuse to take you after all. Indeed, so near perfection do you have to be in appearance and address that it is really simpler and safer to begin your walking right away.

There are not many women driving taxis yet, but they are running elevators acting as conductors on buses, cleaning streets, working in railway yards, running delivery wagons and working in munition factories. It is a curious thing that in all the manual strenuous and more virile work heretofore done by the men, the women now excel, but those trying to replace the men in the finer, seemingly more feminine arts of cooking, tailoring

But bringing airships blazing out of the clouds and women filling bombs instead of nursing bottles, and pedestrians blundering around like moles in the Stygian streets are but commonplace. When it comes to turning all the clocks up an hour for summer and now back again an hour for the winter season, then it does seem going a bit too far. It's so really unsettling for one's social engagements, don't you know, and for the life of her, Lady Diana can't remember whether her date with Lord Percy is at 5 o'clock summer time or winter time. Verily, tempting Fate is as nothing to juggling Time.

Farmers to Reap Large Reward by Rural Credit

of the bonds is to be placed to the credit of "the rural credits loan fund" and it is to be loaned to farmers who actually own and operate their own land, or wish to do so, at an annual interest rate of 5 per cent, and in sums not less than \$200 nor more than \$5,000 to any one individual. The loans are to be secured by notes and mortgages based upon an appraised value of not to exceed 50 per cent of the land, or not to exceed \$50 per acre.

In case loan funds are not available at any time for all applications preference is to be given to applications not exceeding \$2,500 in amount.

The purposes for which the loans are to be limited are, first, the purchase of land; second, the purchase of livestock or other equipment or for the making of improvements that will increase the productivity of the land; third, for the satisfaction of existing encumbrances which have been incurred for any of the other purposes. The loans are to run for not less than 10 nor more than 36 years and are to be repaid by amortization payments which will satisfy the loan and cancel the mortgage, principal and interest accrued at the date of its maturity. Such a loan, however, may be repaid, in excess of the agreed payments in amounts of \$50 or multiples thereof.

It is further provided that the surplus accumulated by the board from interest and repayments shall be placed in a fund to be known as the "rural credits reserve fund," which shall be irrevocable, except to pay possible losses, and which shall be used to make loans on the same conditions as those made from the "rural credits loan fund."

The amendment provides that the legislature of 1917 shall enact such laws as may be necessary to provide machinery for the operations of the act, and especially to guard against speculative use of the money borrowed from the funds. It is provided, however, that in event the legislature fails or neglects to enact such legislation, the board shall put the amendment into effect under rules adopted by it.

The assessed valuation of all property in the state will aggregate about \$80,000,000, according to reported estimates of the state tax commission. This sum will permit the issuance of bonds amounting to \$17,

\$90,000, or a little more than half the total of present outstanding farm mortgages in the state.

The annual interest at 5 per cent on \$17,000,000 of loans would be \$850,000, a saving of \$522,500 to the farmers who are now paying 8 per cent for the same amount of mortgage money.

It would seem probable that the state amendment would largely be able to take care of existing demands from Oregon farmers. In the first place a large percentage of existing farm mortgages are very probably given by men who are not actively en-

gaged in operating farms owned by them, under which circumstances they would not be able to take advantage of the rural credits amendment, limited as it is to those actively engaged in owning and operating their farms. In the second place, money rates for mortgage loans will surely drop in the face of federal and state rural credits acts, which will make present mortgages slow to release existing mortgages prior to their maturity and more quick to renew loans in competition with the rural credit rates. At any rate, between the relief afforded the farmers by both the state and federal acts, they are facing a long desired period in which they will be accorded banking considerations which have up to this time been denied them by the money lenders of the world.
