Milk is Cheap

Taking into consideration the many and important factors which increase the value of milk as food, and also the fact that it requires no preparation and has no waste, it is believed to be true economy to make liberal use of milk in the diet so long as the milk does not cost more than twice as much in proportion to the energy it furnishes to the average of the food eaten.
