

UNITED STATES MAY GIVE HELP

AMERICAN CAPITAL EXPECTED TO BE USED FOR DEVELOPMENT OF ARGENTINE AND RESUMPTION OF WORK.

BUENOS AIRES, Dec. 1.—Minister of Public Works Torello is considering acceptance of financial assistance from the United States for a resumption of important public enterprises which the European war has tied up during many months.

The offer, it was understood here today, was made through Dr. Richard P. Strong, who was introduced to Minister Torello by the big Argentine banker, Carlos A. Tornquist, as the representative of "strong North American interests" with money which they are willing to invest in completion of such undertakings as the Buenos Aires harbor works and the Argentine state-owned railroads.

The minister asked for a detailed proposition, which, in local financial circles, is deemed likely to lead to entrance of North American investors into the Argentine on a large scale in the near future.

It was also reported here today that North American money is now called in the development of Argentine oil deposits. Negotiations, it is said, have been conducted by men high in the present Irigoyen administration. All that any officials would say today was that they were "dealing with representatives of American oil interests whose experts have surveyed the country from Bolivia to Cape Horn."

Minister of Agriculture Pueyrredon is pushing the development scheme.

AMERICAN FLYERS GAIN DISTINCTION

SEVERAL ARE DESIGNATED AS "ACES," SHOWING THAT THEY HAVE DOWNED FIVE GERMAN AEROPLANES.

WITH THE FRANCO-AMERICAN AVIATION SQUAD ON THE SOMME FRONT, Nov. 4.—(By Mail.)—The American aviation corps has just gained a new distinction. Adjutant Ralph Lohery, an American, has been designated an "ace."

An "ace" is an aviator who has brought down five enemy aeroplanes, that is five whose destruction has been completely and officially confirmed. There are just twenty-one "aces" in all the French aviation service—and Lohery is No. 21. Incidentally that number, 21, represents the exact number of German aviators which the French-American flying squadron has brought down according to official count. Many more have probably been downed, but French official lists take cognizance only of machines whose destruction has been officially confirmed.

The American squadron, as it is now constituted, in addition to two French officers, Captain George Thénault and Lieutenant De Laage, consists of Lieut. William Thaw, Adjutant Didier Malson and Ralph Lohery; Sergeants Charles Johnson, Lawrence Ramsey, Dudley Hill, Mr. Cavetka of Madison, Conn., Robert Rockwell and James MacCamel; Corporals Soubrin, Kairland and Frederick Prince.

The corps has had three killed—Chapman, Rockwell and Prince—and two wounded—Lieutenant Traw (now in America) and Bolzy of Texas, who is injured for life.
