LOGGING ROAD TO ASPEN LAKE MAY MEAN MILL

ROAD HAS BEEN SURVEYED TO TAP TIMBER BELT

AGED PIONEER IS CALLED BY GRIM REAPER AT LAST

WALLACE BALDWIN DIES OF INFIRMITIES OF AGE

Was Born in Philadelphia 88 Years Ago, and Moved West When a Boy. For Years Has Resided in Klamath County, and is Known by Pioneers as Saddle and Harness Maker and Good Citizen.

After lying close to the next world for many days, Wallace Baldwin, Klamath pioneer, yesterday afternoon passed into the great beyond.

His funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock, and will be in charge of the Odd Fellows and Rebekah lodges.

Wallace Baldwin was born in Philadelphia, October 5, 1828. When 8 years old he moved with his parents to St. Louis, and when 18 years of age came to San Francisco.

From 1873 until 1885 he ran cattle in Jackson and Klamath counties, and in 1885 moved with his family to Klamath Falls.

Wallace Baldwin was best known by the old timers of Klamath county as the proprietor of a harness shop.

The deceased has been a member of the I. O. O. F. lodge for nearly fifty years, and was a charter member of the Odd Fellows and Rebekah lodges in Klamath Falls.

He is survived by a wife and three children, Robert T. Herbert and Mrs. John Uerling, the only daughter. He was a half brother of Judge George T. Baldwin.

CARRANZA MEN NOW SURROUND CHIHUAHUA CITY

HEAVY COLUMN IS ORDERED TO MAKE ATTACK

State Department is Authority for Statement That Americans in Occupied City Left it Before Fighting Began—Refugees Say Villa Ordered No Looting When He Got Possession of Chihuahua City.

EL PASO, Dec. 2.—General Gonzales, commander of the Carranzista garrison in Juarez, announces that a heavy column of de facto troops, under General Murguía, reached Chihuahua City during the night.

The city is surrounded on two sides and General Murguía has ordered an attack.

Consul Bravo has not learned whether or not the battle has started.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 2.

The state department says all Americans left Chihuahua City before Villa began his attack on the city.

It is believed that no foreigners were killed except the Chinese.

ALLIED FLEET BOMBARDING CAPTIVITY OF GREEKS

Residents of City Are Fleeing and Close Streets—Troops Loyal to Constantinople and Those Led by Venizelos Exchange Shots in Harbor of Monia of Paros, Aegina, Serres, and Other Aegean.

LONDON, Dec. 2.—After the allies and the Greeks had effected an armistice earlier in the day, the Evening Star says this evening that the armistice has failed.

The battle in the hills south of Athens has been renewed and the Franco-British naval forces have started an artillery attack.

Greek revolutionaries and French troops skirmished at three points on the outskirts of Athens.

1917 County Budget Would Raise \$405,360

A total of \$495,840 will be levied on Klamath county property, if the budget made out by the county court and published in today's Herald is ultimately approved in full.

Later this month the county court will meet and hear objections to the budget and then will finally determine what it shall be.

Probably most important among the items of the budget are \$60,000 for new court house construction, \$60,000 for the roads of the county, \$11,500 for the work of County Agricultural Inspector, \$2,000 for a high school gymnasium, \$2,000 for a county district attorney and "upholding the criminal law," \$12,250 for county poor and widows.

The levy of \$2,000 for a high school gymnasium means that a building is to be erected just south of the county high school in Klamath Falls.

It is expected that the levy of \$20,000 for the new court house will be approved.

Eight thousand dollars will be levied for the work of the county auditor and for the work of the county clerk.
