GERARD CARRIES
AMERICAN VIEWSUNITED STATES AMBASSADOR TO
GERMANY LEAVES FOR BERLIN
WITH CLEAR SUMMARY OF
AMERICA'S ATTITUDE.United Press Service.
NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—Ambassador James W. Gerard today sailed on the steamer Frederick VIII to resume his duties at Berlin, leaving President Wilson determined to pursue the same course as in the past toward Germany.

The ambassador carried with him a clear summary of this government's attitude on all questions now pending between Germany and the United States, gained in conferences with the president in the first talks he has had with the president since the war began.

While here the ambassador assured those with whom he talked that the danger of certain radical elements in the empire overthrowing the influence of the German government was trifling.

Before sailing Gerard expressed the belief that many of the belligerent countries—Germany at least—will do all of their buying in their own countries.

"If our peace and prosperity is to continue," he told a group of New York business men, "we must give permission for business men to combine for foreign trade."

The president embodies this same idea in his message to congress today.

COURT UPHOLDS
THE COMMISSIONHIGHEST TRIBUNAL SAYS RAIL-
ROADS MAY CHARGE LESS TO
PACIFIC COAST THAN TO THE
INLAND CITIES.United Press Service.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 5. The supreme court held in a decision handed down today that the interstate commerce commission had a right to permit railroads to charge less for freight carried to Pacific Coast points than they charge to inland cities along the route.

This decision disposes of the famous Pacific terminals case, which has been in court a long time.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 5.—Officers of the traffic bureau of the San Francisco chamber of commerce, which has been fighting to keep the coast freight rates lower than inland rates, declared today that the decision of the supreme court meant the battle was won.

For several years the cities along the coast have made a fight against "backhaul" charges. The inland towns protested paying rates to the coast terminals and then "backhaul" charges in addition.
