The formal program will open at 1 o'clock on Tuesday, January 2d, with an inspection of the new hog barn, to be immediately followed by a discussion of the problem, "How many hogs can Oregon profitably produce?" by Professor E. L. Potter. This will be followed by four days of instruction and training in the solution of Oregon's most important hog problems, including judging hogs for breeding and feeding purposes, methods of feeding, feeding rations

and co-operative shipping of hogs. Teachers for these subjects and leaders in the various demonstrations are successful hog growers of Oregon. Among them are C. C. Darnell, North Portland; Robert Withycombe, Union and A. R. Bohasky, North Portland.
