SOCIALIST VOTE
IS FLUCTUATING

1916 VOTE SLIGHTLY HIGHER THAN 1904 AND 1908, BUT MUCH LOWER THAN FIGURE FOR 1912. COMPILATIONS SHOW

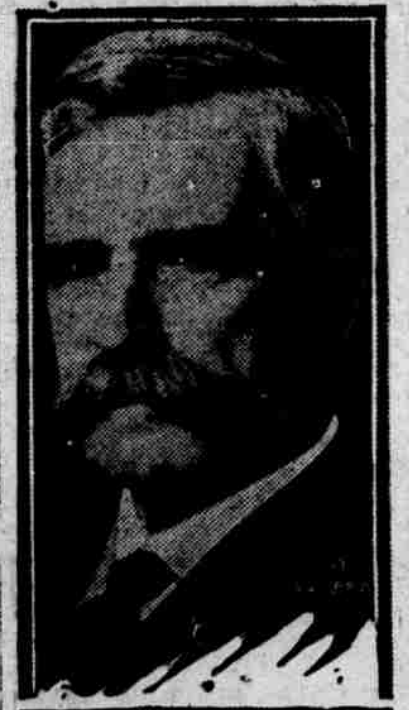
SACRAMENTO, Dec. 6.—What about the socialist vote in California? Is it decreasing or increasing?

In the 1904 presidential election, the socialist candidate, Eugene V. Debs, polled 29,535 votes in this state. In 1908 Debs polled 28,659, and in 1912, 79,201. In the recent election, Allan Benson, the socialist candidate, polled 42,619.

This fluctuation in the socialist vote during the past twelve years is furnishing a hard problem for the political dopesters. Comparing the 1912 and 1916 votes two things are indicated: Either the socialists polled an abnormal vote in 1912 or 30,000 of them did not support their party this year to support either Wilson, Hughes or J. Frank Hanly.

One election dopester, who has followed the figures closely for several years, voiced the opinion that the socialist vote in 1912 was abnormal, the split in the republican party having been responsible. This year, according to this man's opinion, when the republican party seemed reunited again, most of these republicans who voted for Debs four years ago, returned to the republican fold. This view, he pointed out, would indicate that the vote of actual socialists has increased slightly instead of diminishing. The socialist vote this year was about 14,000 more than Debs polled eight years ago.

of \$25,000,000

Before Chester A. Congdon, republican national committeeman from Minnesota, died the other day, people of the Middle West knew him to be a wealthy man. Outside he was known only to those persons who had come in contact with him, and not at all to the general public. Yet the appraisal of his estate at his home in Duluth showed him to be worth \$25,000,000. He was a lawyer who had abandoned the practice to go into mines and mining.

More Than Billion and
Half Needed for 1917

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 6.—It will take \$1,654,519,654.03 to run the government of the United States from June 30, 1917, to June 30, 1919. This is the estimate of the heads of the various branches of the government today through Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo. Of this grand total of more than a billion and a half dollars the various establishments estimates are set forth as follows:

The total estimate for the needs of the government during the next fiscal year exceeds by \$87,197,559.98 the amount appropriated for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1917.

With the exception of the postal service the needs for defense and preparedness was shown in the report, constitute the largest single items.

For the pay of the navy \$51,023,776.15 is required, exclusive of that for the marine corps, which requires \$7,133,002.78. For the ship building program for the year 1916, \$96,962,200 is asked, and \$5,133,000.00 will be necessary for extending the aviation branch of the service. For increase of navy heretofore authorized \$118,946,155, it is estimated, will be needed.

Provisions and clothing for the marines, it is estimated will cost \$6,225,385, and provisions for the navy \$10,144,943. For ordnance and ordnance stores \$9,402,485 is required, and for organizing the naval reserve force and schools and camps of instruction \$160,000. A single item for bringing home the remains of officers and men who die abroad amounts to \$42,658. Needs for pay and traveling and general expenses of the army is listed at \$97,794,995.56, and for signal service development \$16,600,000 is asked. The greater portion of this

is for aviation. The estimate for supply, services and transportation for the army is \$97,794,995.56.

A total of \$200,000 is asked for vocational training in the army and for ordnance, ordnance supplies and stores \$14,315,000 is asked. For the manufacture of arms \$6,805,000 is the estimated need; for the purchase of automatic machine rifles \$2,085,000; for armored motor cars \$1,508,000. Civilian military training camps require \$3,591,000.

Among the estimates for the equipment of the National Guard are:

For arming, training and equipping the National Guard 12,727,000
Estimate for supply, services and transportation for the army is \$71,741,786.15. The war department asks for \$56,999,481.21 for fortifications and other works of defense and \$32,136,063.96 for rivers and harbors.

The interior department wants \$8,283,000 for the reclamation service, and the department of commerce asks \$2,604,300 for light houses, beacons and fog signals. The needs of the coast guard are estimated at \$6,286,072.

For maintenance of the Interstate Commerce Commission \$5,600,000 is needed. The war department requires \$352,320 for national cemeteries and \$210,000 for artificial limbs, while the interior department wishes \$10,590,672.05 for the construction and operation of the railroads in Alaska.

The expenses of the United States courts are estimated at \$7,769,736. To pay the salaries and mileage of senators \$771,000 is required, and to cover the same items for members of the house \$3,479,500. The general salary account of the senate amounts to \$893,687.50, of the house \$1,315,750.25.

A contribution toward the expense of the peace palace at The Hague, amounting to \$1,045.35, is listed among the items needed.

POPE MAKES A
FINAL APPEAL

BELIEVED TO HAVE DELIVERED REVIEW OF FIRST ATTEMPT FOR PEACE; THEN STOP IT, AND THEN SHORTEN IT

ROME, Dec. 6.—The pope's review of his attempt to prevent the war, then to stop it, then to shorten it, coupled with a new and final appeal for peace, is believed to have been delivered by the pontiff to a secret consistory here today. It is said to be one of the most important documents issued by the vatican since the war began. The pope has been working on it for many weeks.

The allocution will show, it is said, how the Holy See has been absolutely neutral in the war, predicating all its actions on a desire to stop or shorten hostilities and alleviate the sufferings of those affected. It is believed the allocution will make another earnest appeal to the faithful throughout the world to continue their prayers for peace.

It is said that in conferring with Cardinals Gasparri, Delal, Falconio, Vannutelli and Seranfini the pope decided not to refer in the allocution to Polish autonomy, the deportation of Belgians nor efforts of individual neutral nations for peace.
