## Night Court is Tried in Frisco

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 7.—Spending the night in jail will become a less popular pastime after tonight, because the new city night and women's court opens tonight.

The first case will be heard before Police Judge Timothy I. Fitzpatrick of Court No. 1 at 11 p. m. Court sessions will continue until 2 a. m. when the judge retires. Anyone arrested up to that hour provided he is not charged with a felony or was not under the influence of liquor when taken into custody or arrested on a warrant will be tried at the night court if he demands.

The week following Judge Fitzpatrick's sitting Police Judge John J. Sullivan will preside and he will be followed in order by Judges Mathew Brady and Morris Oppenheim.

Admiral Beatty is only 45 years of age, and is consequently the youngest man who has ever had full charge of Great Britain's main fleet.

## Way for Distribution of Relief Supplies is Open

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—That the way is open in all the war-stricken countries of Europe and Asia for the distribution of relief funds and supplies, is the statement upon the eve Thanksgiving, of treasurers and other officials of organizations for war relief, nearly all of whose headquarters are in New York. Among these treasurers are Frank A. Vanderlip, Henry Clews and Charles R. Crane. This situation is true of France, Germany, England, Belgium, Austria, Poland, Russia, Serbia, Armenia and Syria with exception. Distribution is not so easy in some of these countries as in others, and not so easy in some portions of some of those countries as in some other portions of them. It is certain, however, because it is being done all the time, that funds intended for any one of the suffering countries are distributed economically and with little delay. Difficulty as to distribution of relief is no longer a reason for withholding gifts, if it has been a reason at any time. This is true of Poland even, according to those connected with the fund for Polish relief, whose founder and head is Ignaco Lutrowski and whose treasurer is Frank A. Vanderlip.

"The only real difficulty now," said an official of a well-known relief organization today, "in the way of adequate relief is that the American people do not yet realize the awful need, nor that the need is daily increasing." The Belgian commission asserts that the need in Belgium is greater than ever in spite of the common belief that the need there has in large measure been relieved because America has given \$12,000,000 for Belgian relief. Two hundred and fifty million dollars has been spent in America by the commission for food, clothing and other necessities, but it is pointed out that America has given less than five per cent of that amount.

The relief officers in New York note that the children of America are responding to the need on the other side with increasing amounts. The incoming mails contain many thousands of most interesting and touching letters from American children, such as the following from a little girl: "I am so sorry you are starving to death. All of our school will get us some money to send you. We go to

school every day. I gave the teacher some money to send you. There are some things I would like to send you. We are going to send you some more money later on. I hope to find you in peace. I guess you are not happy because you are about to starve. From your friend, Blanch McClelland."

Not only the president in his Thanksgiving proclamation, but the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ of America, and some of the leading pastors of New York, and others, including Dr. W. T. Hanning, rector of Trinity church; Dr. John H. Jowett, pastor of the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian church, and Hon. Joseph H. Choate have issued an appeal urging the churches of America to take offerings for foreign relief.

## Studying North American Way



Dr. E. R. Mexia, who has been both agricultural and public works minister in the Argentine republic, has been in the United States for some time to make a study for the benefit of his people. He has been entertained by those interested in Pan-American affairs.
